

ANOTHER TIFF ON WAR SERVICE IN LEGISLATURE

Cities of 15,000 Population
To Have Sunday Cars.

TORONTO, April 20.—After two previous sporadic starts, the budget debate got under way in the Legislature this afternoon. Charles McCrea, Conservative member for Sudbury, was the first speaker. Mr. McCrea criticized the bookkeeping system adopted by Hon. Peter Smith, making particular reference to the transfer of a portion of the receipts of the department of lands, forests and mines from ordinary to capital revenue.

Hon. Mr. Smith, Mr. McCrea argued, had left himself only a margin of a little over \$4 million dollars to cover the additional supplementary estimates and statutory expenditure of at least \$5,000,000. In view of this, the member for Sudbury foresaw a deficit of \$1,000,000 or more.

W. J. Johnston, South Lanark, got into a quarrel with Mr. McCrea. Johnston's charge that the issue of conscription had placed the farmers in power. Such a charge, Mr. Johnston contended, came ill from a party which had not had an actual fighting man among its members.

Thomas Magladery, Conservative member for Temiskaming, took exception to the statement, asking the member to repeat it. "I believe there is not one man on the Conservative benches who served in the front lines as a fighting man," Mr. Johnston replied.

"I had the honor to serve with the 15th Battalion," retorted Mr. Magladery, his voice trembling with emotion. "I served as a lieutenant in the front ranks, and I consider it is up to the member to withdraw his remarks."

"I am only speaking as Conservative members have spoken," Mr. Johnston persisted.

"I ask that the honorable member withdraw his statement, as it is absolutely false," Mr. Magladery demanded.

K. E. Homuth, Labor member for South Waterloo, who was in the chair during the temporary absence of the speaker, asked that Mr. Johnston withdraw his statement.

"If there is a man on the Conservative benches who had the nerve to serve with a fighting unit, I withdraw it," Mr. Johnston conceded.

"The honorable member should withdraw it without any such qualification," Mr. Magladery insisted.

"I trust the member for South Lanark will withdraw the remark, as I have requested," the deputy speaker warned.

The member for South Lanark consented to do so.

For North Ontario, Zolique Mageau, Liberal member for Sturgeon Falls, pleaded the cause of North Ontario, which he declared, was not getting one-tenth of the money which it had furnished to the province for the last 25 years. He strongly urged development of water-power on the French River. Mr. Mageau did not finish his speech, but moved the adjournment of the debate.

An amendment to the dog tax and sheep production act, introduced by Hon. Manning Doherty, permits counties to pool the dog taxes collected in the various municipalities into one central fund, out of which payments may be made for all sheep killed by dogs.

Premier Drury stated in reply to H. H. Dewar, that amendments to the workmen's compensation act would be forthcoming at an early date.

The acoustics of the chamber appeared to be particularly bad, for it was difficult to catch the words of either speaker.

"Did the premier say 'yes' or 'no'?" a Conservative member demanded. He was informed that the reply had been in the affirmative.

An amendment to the Railway Act, which received the third reading, will permit the operation of Sunday street cars in all cities of over 15,000 population. The amendment was designed to extend the privilege of free travel to 30,000, but at the suggestion of Mr. Dewar this figure was reduced. The present limit is 20,000.

YOUNG MAN CAUGHT UNDER AN ELEVATOR INSTANTLY KILLED

Charles Fetter of Hepworth
Was Making Repairs To
Machinery.

BRAKES FAILED TO WORK

Victim's Neck Broken in An
Effort To Escape
From Pit.

OWEN SOUND, April 20.—Charles Fetter, 18 years of age, was instantly killed at the Hepworth Furniture Company's factory, Hepworth, early today, when an elevator to which he had been assisting in making some repairs suddenly dropped and caught him in the pit.

Fetter was assisting the superintendent of the factory, S. Stuckey, to adjust the elevator platform about 8 o'clock, and was in the pit putting a belt on a pulley, when the brake of the elevator slipped and the automatic safety brake failing to work, the 800-pound elevator, with the superintendent on it, suddenly dropped five feet, caught the unfortunate lad just as he got his head out of the pit in his attempt to escape, breaking his neck and killing him instantly.

Young Fetter had been employed in the factory for some time and was highly thought of by his employers. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Fetter of Hepworth, and is survived by his parents, five brothers and one sister.

Dr. Fisher, the coroner of Bruce County, was called from Wingham, after an investigation decided that an inquest was unnecessary.

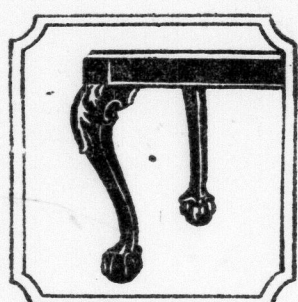

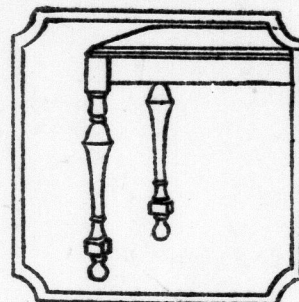

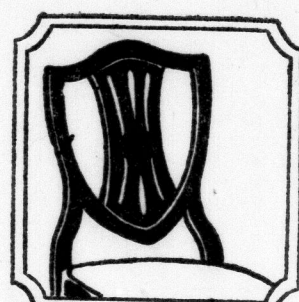
Five Cross-Sectional Views Showing the Characteristics of Well-Known Period Designs



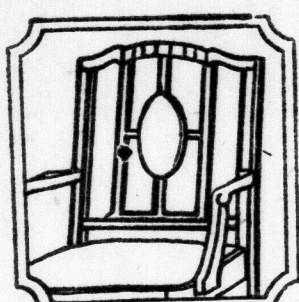
The Chippendale — much carving, lattice and fretwork is to be found in this Period. Cabriole legs with claw and ball feet are outstanding characteristics of this Period.



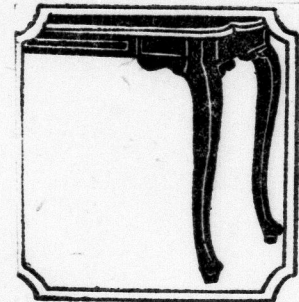

The Heppelwhite, a design with abundance of curves, straight, square or turned legs, shield and oval back chairs, the decorative motif being rosettes and paterals.



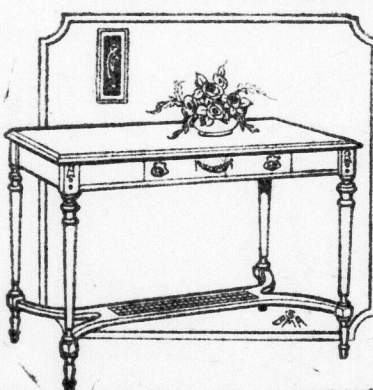

The Queen Anne Period is characterized by extremely graceful curves, the design lending itself beautifully to furniture for living-room, dining-room and sleeping-room.

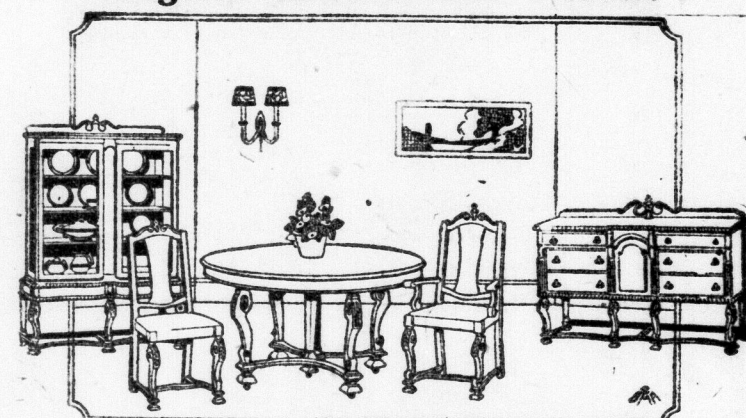

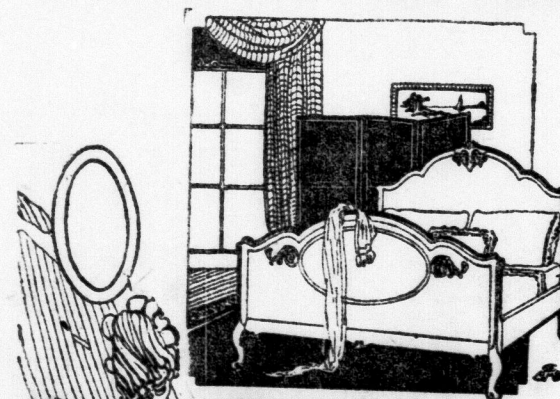

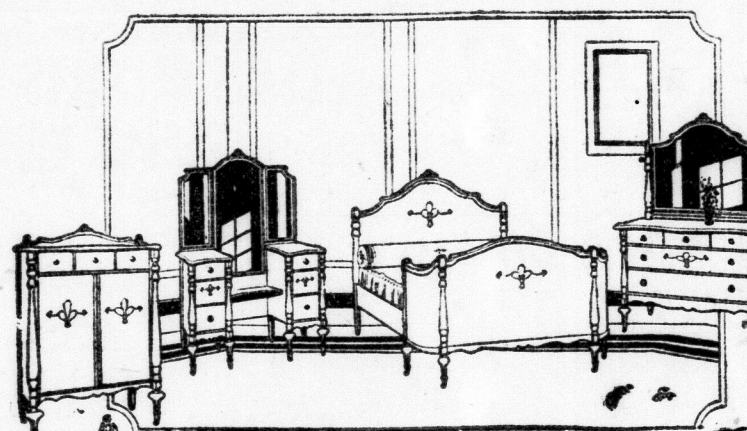

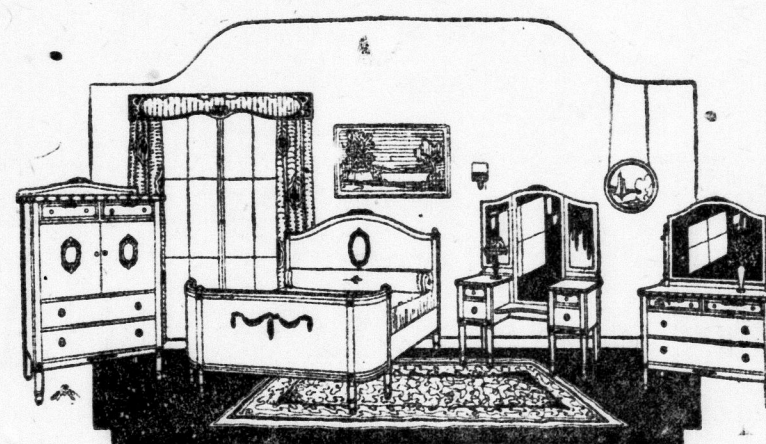


Walnut Suite From The Empire Period

This Suite Is From the Time of Louis XVI

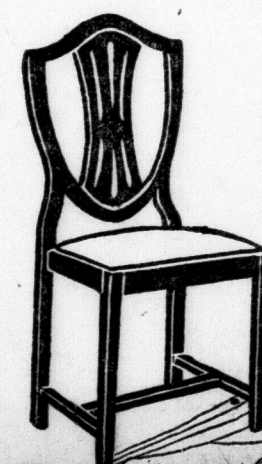
