### SPARE THE ROD

College Professor Evolves New Way To Train Children. New York, Oct. 16.—Shall the birch, moral suasion, and every other species of old fashioned punishment with which the fathers and mothers of the present generation trained their children in the way they should go yield to the hypnotic pill, or shall the rod replace the personal influence of mothers?

This is the problem which women in New York are battling with just now. Particularly members of the New York City Mothers' Club. Not that they are considering for a moment adopting such measures to reduce their youngsters to subjection. On the contrary, they are combating the idea with every fibre of their being.

It is Dr. John D. Quackenbush, professor emeritus of Columbia College, who threw this brand into their midst and roused their righteous indignation. Mothers Stunned by Theory.

In a paper on "Moral Diseases of Children," read before a recent conference of mothers, the Sandy Hill speaker pronounced his new theory, which paralyzed the mothers.

"After this," he said, "if your boy runs away from school and then fabricates about it, give him a pill and tell him he mustn't do it any more."

Dr. Quackenbush then asked to-day something about his theory which stirred up the women so, said in one respect he had been misled. He says he did not advocate the hypnotic pill except when all other means failed; it then was to be given only under the direction of a responsible physician. But that autocratic tendencies in children has effected a cure was a theory but an actuality.

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Several instances were mentioned where boys had been misled by hypnotic suggestion. One was the case of a nervous, sensitive boy who had been hypnotized by a school teacher. The hypnotic pill made him a good fighter.

"Supposing," went on the speaker, "that one of your naughty children is sufficiently naïve to call for interference. Let the mother and a favorable opinion of the child be the result of the night sleep, and the mother will be able to sleep and the child will be able to sleep."

MURDER IN A CHURCH.

Charlotte, N. C., Oct. 17.—Clay Grubbe, a prominent distiller, shot and instantly killed O. L. Davis, his brother-in-law and former business partner, at Piney Church, Davidson County, yesterday.

Davis was attending services at church when Grubbe walked up behind him and emptied three chambers of his revolver into his body. Grubbe immediately surrendered to the authorities. There had been blood between the two for some time. Davis leaves a family and was a man of wealth.

MAY GO TO KINGSTON. Col. Otter Stated to Succeed L. Col. Read at the College.

Ottawa, Oct. 17.—Lieut. Col. Read is giving up his position of commandant of Kingston College next July. The term for which he was appointed does not expire until Jan. 15, but at Lieut. Col. Read's own request, he will be allowed to go six months head of time. His successor has not been chosen, but the suggestion that Col. Otter may be selected may turn out to be correct.

Guesing Competition. The initial stage of the guesing competition being conducted by the Calculus Co., 9 Toronto-st., who have deposited \$2500 with the Trusts and Guarantee Co. for distribution, closed at noon yesterday. By the terms of the contest a prize of \$2500 is offered for the nearest estimate of the total vote to be polled in the general elections of Nov. 5, while additional prizes of \$250 each are offered for the closest guesses received during each of the three periods ending with noon of the 24th, 25th and 31st.

Yesterday noon marked the expiration of the first limit, with about 45 guesses registered, representing the computations of some 80 competitors. On an equitable basis the value of each vote received during the period closed is considerably in excess of what has been received theretofore, since each entry of \$1 entitles the maker to four attempts to lift the veil of the future.

Six Dead in Fire. New York, Oct. 17.—Six persons were suffocated and 15 were overcome by smoke in a fire which gutted a five-story brick double tenement house at 15 Moore-street, Williamsburg, early to-day. Two of the injured—a boy and girl—will probably die. Incendiaries are suspected. The dead are: Benjamin Warkulsky, aged 11; Gustav Warkulsky, aged 14; and Charles Warkulsky, aged 15.

Mad Soldier's Deed. Manila, Oct. 17.—Second Lieut. William D. Pritchard, in a fit of insanity, shot and killed Lieut. L. Deen. He then shot and killed himself.

Inspected Rodeau Park. Thomas Gibson of the bureau of mines has been prospecting Rodeau Park along with Dr. Clark. The park consists of 4000 acres in Kent County and it is proposed to maintain it as a perpetual forest and beautify it for park purposes.

Next Meeting in Quebec. The congress of Americanists, which has recently concluded at Stuttgart, will hold its next meeting at Quebec in 1905. The congress is a European and American and is devoted to prehistoric American research.

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
