Army and Navy Veterans, and a large number of prominent citizens. On arrival at the park His Honor and party ascended the platform, erected for the occasion, when No. 2 Company Canadian Regiment of Infantry band played the National Anthem. On the opposite side of the square facing the platform were 1,500 school children on raised seats who rendered a number of patriotic selections, accompanied by the Royal Grenadier Band.

His Honor the Lieut.-Governor presided. He first called on the children to sing "God Save the Queen," and the Hon. Thos. Ballantyne, Speaker of the Legislative Assembly, to read the opening prayer (the form prescribed for use in the Local Legislature).

The Lieut.-Governor then delivered an address, after which the children sang "The Maple Leaf for Ever" in grand style.

Addresses were delivered by Hon. Thos. Ballantyne, Hon. J. M. Gibson, Provincial Secretary; Hon. Richard Harcourt, Provincial Treasurer; G. F. Marter, M.P.P.; W. McCleary, M.P.P.; and Rev. Dr. Scadding, President of the Pioneer and Historical Association of Ontario. Between the speeches the children sang "Hail to the Land" and "Rule Britannia."

The proceedings closed with singing the National Anthem, and three cheers for the Queen and three for Lieut.-Governor Kirkpatrick.

The Centennial Celebration Committee have published a memorial volume, 500 copies to be presented to the Local Legislature, each member of the Committee and others who assisted in the celebrations. A Centennial medal was also struck commemorative of the event.

At Niagara, in front of the court house, the Committee erected a memorial fountain, also marked four historical spots by placing on each a large stone (boulder).

Through the persistent appeals made by our President and others of our Association, we have reason to believe that the Ontario Government will shortly make a beginning towards the erection of a monument to the memory of Governor Simcoe by locating a site in front of the new Parliament buildings and provide a design for same.
