64TH BATTALION

Sergeant Stairs Gives Up His Stripes

—Rumors of Return to Sussex

—Truro Man Killed

Sergeant Stairs of the 64th has given up his stripes to enlist as a private in the 64th in order to help with the recruiting, according to a message from Valcartier. This is the first intimation of preparations for organizing the 64th.

In a recent copy of an English paper appears pictures of "a patriotic family." Mr. W. G. Langworthy, Mrs. Langworthy of Exmouth street, and their four sons, all of whom are in military service, with the exception, of course, of the mother. Among the sons is Lance Corporal Harry Langworthy of the 29th.
