SPECIAL EVENTS IN CHURCHES SUNDAY

C. G. I. Groups At Centenary—Civic Matters Pulpit Subjects

At a special meeting of the congregation of the Waterloo street Baptist church last night a call was extended to Wallace Forgey, who is now in the final year of his course in divinity at Acadia University and has had an exceptionally brilliant record as a student and as a preacher in summer mission work.

Mr. Forgey is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ferdinand Forgey, of Fairville, and is a member of the Fairville Baptist church. The Waterloo street church call is to take effect on April 1 if it is accepted by Mr. Forgey. He has been heard in the pulpits of several of the city churches by his ability as a preacher and his scholarly attainments. Mr. Forgey has been student supply during the summer months at Grand Bay, Shediac and Chatham Harbor and won the very high regard of the people in those districts. The present pastor of the Waterloo street church, Rev. E. R. MacWilliam, has accepted call to the Victoria street Baptist church.

AT CENTENARY The services in Centenary church yesterday were of a special nature and large congregations were present.

In the morning members of the C. G. I. groups directed the service and very ably presented to the congregation the various phases of this important branch of the church activity. Rev. H. G. Fulton, the pastor, conducted the service. Four C. G. I. members, Miss Lillian Thomas, Miss Frances Elkin, Miss Violet Snelgrove and Miss Gretchen Morabuse gave short addresses with reference to the four-fold program of the C. G. I. and the other activities, which they had carried on including charity work, providing programs for the pleasure of the residents in Old Ladies' Home, and the Home for Incubables and assisting the pastor by leading the singing for solo and violin.

All members of the Sunday school met together for a special session in the afternoon when "Talent" Sunday was observed and each department of the church presented a special number of the program. Songs, instrumental music and recitations were included in the program that was greatly enjoyed by the audience. A large attendance in the absence of the superintendent, Grant Smith, the Sunday school service was presided over by Norman Marshall, the associate superintendent.

At the evening service, Mr. Fulton gave a forceful sermon on how Jesus met the critic of His Miller. The Great Refusal was the title of a most interesting sermon delivered in St. David's church last evening by Rev. Hugh Miller, B.D. It was a spiritual drama of the coming election, the story of the Rich Young Ruler. The sermon dealt with it in three divisions, which were the most appealing manner. The first was a portrayal and character sketch of the man. He was young, with all the possibilities of youth, and life was very sweet to him. Because of his personal attractiveness and character he enjoyed a high social standing. He was rich, but his riches did not crowd out the interest in other matters. He longed after higher things. He decided to interview Christ, said Mr. Miller.

Upon the minister completing his talk on the first division, the choir sang very sweetly "Just as I Am." The second act opens with this young man kneeling in the presence of Christ and beseeching Him for eternal life. Christ inquired as to his past life, the test of the commandments being applied. He recognized the evidence of wealth in his costly robes and jeweled fingers. He saw into the soul of the inquirer and knew what he lacked. Proudly the young man declared that he kept all the commandments. Then Christ told him to sell all.



final sermon in the course on the Great Religious Teachers of Greece. To answer the question "What is Truth?" Plato the Prophet of Greece devoted his entire life. After the death of Socrates, Plato spent several years traveling especially in Egypt, and there in the University city of Heliopolis became acquainted with all the wisdom of the Egyptians. Here also it is held, he came into contact with the Bible and its teachings. Returning to Athens in the year 387, B. C. he founded his school.

It is said that the judicial murder of Socrates by the restored democracy in the year 399, and the increasing license and weakness of popular rule embittered his spirit and developed the conviction that all existing forms of government were mere partisan factions, and that there was no hope of salvation for the cities of Greece until either Philosophers became Kings, or Kings should become Philosophers.

DOCTRINE OF GOD. "Doctor Morison sketched Plato's doctrine of God indicating that he regarded God as Father, Eternal Just, Benevolent and desiring the good of all men. Plato expected that all men would be good, and that the universe would see evidences of God. He believed also in the doctrine of particular providence. Plato, however, differed from the Bible in his theory of creation. He took for granted an eternal matter or chaos upon which God works and eternal ideas or models according to which he works. That God was a blind nature power, and to this Plato ascribes the source of all evil. This of course, landed him in a certain type of dualism, which holds that there are two uncreated rival principles or persons between which there is eternal strife, and Dr. Morison observed that it was only with difficulty that the early Christian thinkers grasped the pure idea of Creator and creature. As to Plato's doctrine of man, Dr. Morison pointed out that Plato held that there was some divine original stuff in man's nature, and that the soul of man before his birth lived with God, face to face with eternal realities, enjoying perfect, purely spiritual blessedness.

IDEAS OF WOODSWORTH. "Thus we observe that most of the ideas of Woodsworth's 'Ode to Immortality' were borrowed from Plato. After indicating that it was in Plato that we might discover the philosophical basis of asceticism, Dr. Morison concluded by picturing Plato's blending of the human soul to a chariot with two horses, one dark and mortal, the other white and immortal, and compared Plato's doctrine here to that of St. Paul as described in the 7th Chapter of The Epistle to the Romans beginning with the 16th verse.

FIREMEN OUT 3 TIMES ON SUNDAY

Brick Building At Main Street And Douglas Avenue Ablaze

Blaze in Sears Premises in King Street Also Gives Department Battle

Fire on Sunday evening caused damage estimated at \$10,000 to the brick building at the corner of Douglas avenue and Main street. It destroyed the dental rooms of Dr. J. C. Doore, burned the roof-timbers, burned through the floor and a quantity of water into the Provincial Bank on the ground floor. In the millinery store conducted by Miss F. Coughlan the stock was damaged by smoke and water. Dr. Doore is owner of the building. He has been located in Boston for a year and had retained his Saint John business under the direction of Drs. F. A. Ainsworth and J. R. Hutchinson. Dr. Doore is expected in the city tomorrow or next day.

Miss Coughlan is at present in New York and has been notified of the fire by telegraph. All the tenants carried insurance, but Dr. Ainsworth could not say what amount Dr. Doore had.

BANK SUFFERS W. L. Gray, manager of the Provincial Bank of Canada branch, says his branch was not damaged by the fire and somewhat enlarged. The damage done there is almost entirely from water, tons of which poured down on the floor from the fire in the quarters above. The chemical compound used at the outlet was also confined to the dental rooms but the stationery was saved by salvage covers. Manager Gray gives the fire-fighters due credit for saving the valuable glass doors, plate glass front and other breakables in the strenuous fight to save the building. The fact that the fire was contained to the dental rooms and did not spread to any extent into the Ainsworth apartments, excepting in the roof spaces, is also creditable to the fire of the North End department, it is said.

There was an unoccupied store in the building between the bank premises on the corner and the millinery store at the Douglas avenue extremity. This store was a fine time to the damage done far along the frontage was mostly water leakage and smoke smudge.

HYDRANTS FROZEN

There was considerable comment among bystanders during the fire because of the frozen state of the hydrants at the Douglas avenue corner and in front of No. 5 engine house, Main street, less than a block distant. These were the two most necessary sources of water supply to this particular fire. It was not for some minutes that the failure of the flow was conjectured and then additional lines of hose were run from the St. Peter's church location and down Main street (St. Luke's) hill.

KING STREET BLAZE Damage to the extent of about \$3,000 was caused by fire, smoke and water to the Sears building and contents at 21 and 23 King street, yesterday morning at 4:40 o'clock, and would have undoubtedly been more serious if not discovered at that time by James Torrey, taxi driver, who was passing along the street. The "Venice Sweets", fruit, confectionery and ice cream parlor, conducted by George Pittson on the ground floor, received the most damage. The proprietor says that his loss is only partially covered by insurance. The Royal Cigar Store, next door, also conducted by Mr. Pittson, and a barber shop in the rear, conducted by J. L. Bridges, escaped with smoke damage. The apartments in the upper part of the building, occupied by Morris Thompson, George Pittson and John Sears, were slightly damaged by smoke. Mr. Sears stated yesterday that the damage to the building is fully covered by insurance. The fire is supposed to have started in the vicinity of the furnace, in the basement, and the first intimation that

the building was on fire was when James Torrey noticed smoke issuing from under the front door of the store. He sent in an alarm from Box 23 and when the fire department arrived the basement was full of fire. Three streams of water were poured into this section of the building, and after a hard fight the blaze was under control, but not before the basement was badly gutted and the fire had worked into the rear partitions of the store. The contents and decorations of the store were badly damaged, chiefly by the dense smoke. CALLED TO CLARENCE STREET. The fire department was called out yesterday morning by an alarm from Box 64, for a slight fire in a wood box behind the kitchen store in a house occupied by Mrs. McDonald, 15 Clarence street. The damage was small and the blaze was quickly extinguished.

Spruce Street Home Visited By Burglar Jewelry and a small sum of money were stolen from the home of Ben Robertson, 11 Spruce street, on Sunday evening during church time and the burglar had apparently adopted exactly similar tactics to those followed by the burglar who visited the home of Mrs. Hegan, Hagan street, on a previous Sunday. At Mr. Robertson's house the key was hanging in the vestibule and it is presumed that the burglar let himself in by the front door. There was a trail of matches to show where he had gone.
