"STUFFY" FAILS TO COLLECT \$10,000

Filed Salary Claim Against the Red Sox, But it was Denied.

Chicago, Jan. 12.—A \$10,000 back salary claim filed by "Stuffy" McInnis, first baseman of the Boston Nationals, against the Boston Americans, was denied by Commissioner Landis.

Mr. Landis ruled that McInnis had been declared a free agent by the Cleveland club, which had assumed a three-year contract of the Boston Red Sox and which contract specified that the player could be released on 10 days' notice.

McInnis was under a \$8,000 a year contract with the Red Sox, when Owner Frazee traded him to Cleveland. McInnis objected to the assignment to a club "away from home," based on the fact that he lived near Boston. McInnis was to be given an increase of \$5,000 stretching over a three-year period.

Cleveland assumed the contract and paid McInnis his salary of \$14,000 for the 1923 season. At the close of the season he was released outright. He then signed with the Boston Nationals. McInnis claimed he had an agreement with Frazee for \$5,000 a year while "playing away from home," and sought to collect for the seasons 1922 and 1923.

The indictments are in connection with the transfer of accounts from C. A. Stoneham & Co. to E. D. ANXIOUS TO BOX U. S. CHAMPIONS

Carpenter Wants to Meet Either McTigue or Tunney in March.

New York, Jan. 12.—Georges Carpentier, colorful French boxer, probably will essay an American comeback attempt before the close of the indoor ring season. His manager, Francois Descamps, recently called Tex Rickard, that Carpentier was anxious to come here in February, or March to fight Mike McTigue or Gene Tunney, holders of the world's and American light heavyweight titles, respectively.

The cable from Descamps was simultaneous with the arrival in New York of Eddie Kane, Gibbons' manager, who will confer with Rickard on a Carpentier match as well as a possible return engagement next summer with Jack Dempsey.

Rickard did not indicate what reply he would make to Carpentier's proposals but he probably will offer the Frenchman terms for at least two fights here. Some time ago the promoter sought to sign Carpentier but the latter's financial demands abruptly ended negotiations.

Descamps informed Rickard that he had rejected offers for Carpentier to fight Jack Blumfield, British boxer, and Ermilio Spalla, Italian holder of the European heavyweight title, aboard. He also turned down an offer of American promoters for a bout with Gibbons at Minneapolis next summer.
