Famous French Boxer Expected in America in Less Than Two Months.

Georges Carpentier's American trip will start on May 3, according to definite announcement made by George Kennedy who with Jack Cutley of New York is handling the tour on this continent of the famous French heavyweight.

Curley and Kennedy, who previously announced that they had Carpentier signed up for an American tour of ten weeks, state that following the tour they have an option on the services of the French boxer for five additional weeks.

In announcing the signing of Carpentier the following statement is issued by Jack Curley on behalf of himself and George Kennedy:






