Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, once postmaster general in the Laurier government, thinks Canada should go back to the two cent stamps. The United States have done so. To have a debate on the point he has moved a resolution stating that "The time has come when a cheaper rate of postage and of cable communications should be adopted."

Sir Robert Borden sponsors a resolution to be debated at this session to amend the board of commerce act, passed at the last session so that \$10,000 can be paid annually to the chief commissioner commerce board and \$8,000 annually to each of the other commissioners. F. A. Acland, deputy minister of labor, has been appointed to complete the board.


