War Garden Bulletin

PRACTICAL DAILY GUIDE FOR VACANT LOT AND BACK-YARD GARDENERS EN-LISTED IN GREAT-ER PRODUCTION CAMPAIGN

Issued by the Canada Food Board in Collaboration With Experts on the Staff of the Dominion Experimental Farm

TAKING CARE OF YOUR PEAS.

Every amateur gardener is particularly proud when he manages to raise a good crop of peas. But this is not always the easiest thing in the world, for he has a virulent enemy to contend with in the shape of the pea aphid. This pest is very deceptive, for it is pea green in color and is hard to detect. The aphids cluster on the growing tips and leaves and suck the strength out of the plants. They multiply very quickly, and unless they are attended to as soon as they appear, they are difficult to handle.

As soon as the aphids are discovered spray with nicotine sulphate—two teaspoons to one gallon of water with half an ounce of laundry or other soap dissolved in it. The spray must hit the aphids in order to be effective. In a few hours the aphids will die if the spray is going to kill them. After a day or two spray again if any aphids are left, so as to clear the plants of them as soon as possible.

Mildew is another destructive natural force among peas. It shows as a white coating over the leaves and pods, and ruins the crop. As soon as it appears dust the plants with sulphur and repeat every few days as long as the disease remains. Another remedy is to spray with Bordeaux mixture every ten days until the mildew disappears.

The need for extensive canning this year can scarcely be over-estimated. All our fruit and vegetables must be used to the best advantage. The war gardeners have done their part. Now the housekeepers must do theirs.

A five-cent booklet issued by the Food Board deals with the sugar situation and gives the most up-to-date "conservation" methods of taking care of the fruit and vegetable crops. It is authoritative and the woman who follows it will know that she is doing her patriotic duty and that the methods advocated are those best suited to meet the need of the hour.

Carrots Instead of Eggs.

Boiled carrots, when properly treated, form an excellent substitute for eggs in puddings, &c. Boll the carrots until they are tender and nearly ready to fall apart, drain carefully and mash and press through a coarse cloth or strainer. The pulp is then introduced among the other ingredients of the pudding and the eggs totally omitted. Puddings made in this manner are lighter than where eggs are used, and are palatable. The carrots also impart a fine yellow color to the pudding so that nobody can tell whether eggs were used or not.—Popular Science Monthly.
