Money in Sheep

Special Massachusetts Commission to Visit the Kendall Farms in Bowdoinham for Inspiration in Building up the Sheep Industry

This week the Massachusetts "Special Commission on Sheep Industry, Agriculture and Related Matters" will visit the famous sheep farms of William B. Kendall in Bowdoinham, Maine. This is one of the steps which Massachusetts is taking officially for the promotion of the sheep industry as a means of increasing the supply of wool and mutton for help in winning the war, for the renovation of sheep from dogs, and for the increase of ready money in the pockets of the men who have the courage and the foresight to engage in the sheep business. There was much agitation during the last session of the legislature. The state board of agriculture, backed up by the sheep enthusiasts in trying to get legislation through for the protection of sheep from dogs. A commission of the year before brought in a draft of a bill to remedy the evil, but the dogs had more influence in the legislature than the sheep and the bill though much of a compromise so as to offend the dog people as little as possible, failed. Then a further effort resulted in the creation of the commission named above, to study the subject and report to the legislature.

SPAIN'S TRADE DECREASES. Paris, Sept. 12.—The Official Gazette publishes statistics showing a marked decrease in Spain's imports and exports for the first seven months of the year, notably as compared with 1916. The decrease in imports of raw materials, manufactured goods and foodstuffs was from \$39,000,000 pesetas to \$28,000,000 pesetas. The exports decreased during the same period from \$65,000,000 to \$60,000,000 pesetas.

NEW BRUNSWICK POWER COMPANY

Interim Order of Commission Appointed Under Provisions of "An Act to Appoint a Commission in the Matter of the New Brunswick Power Company."

It appearing to the commission, in the course of the investigation and inquiry, to be justifiable and necessary for the financial temporary relief of the company, that the rates of electricity for power and light should be fixed at the maximum price to be charged for gas, both fuel and lighting, shall be \$2 per 1,000 feet.

That as of the said date, and thereafter until the further order of the commission, the maximum power rates shall be as follows:

First 200 kwh. per month.....15c
Next 200 kwh. per month.....12c
Next 200 kwh. per month.....10c
Over 600 kwh. per month.....7c

Discounts for prompt payment and provisions for minimum bills to remain as in the existing schedule without change.

That as of the said date, and thereafter until the further order of the commission, the maximum rate for gas, both fuel and lighting, shall be \$2 per 1,000 feet.

Any provision in existing schedules for discounts or minimum bills to remain unchanged.

That as of the said date, and thereafter until the further order of the commission, the street railway fare shall be 5 cents.

The commission has caused the accounts of the company to be examined by Messrs. Lybrand, Ross, Bro. & Montgomerie, a firm of certified public accountants familiar with public utility accounts.

It is not within the authority of the commission to amend the contract for the purchase of the power of the company, which the company is acting with equal public spirit in this matter.

he had been successful in securing a mixer with a capacity of 1,000 yards a day and also some other machinery necessary for the prompt completion of the work, which, if the weather continues favorable, is expected to be finished by October 20.

E. S. Carter, representing the provincial public works department, and Mr. Clark, superintendent of the work, with the manager and superintendent of construction of the N. B. Telephone Company on Thursday inspected the road and made arrangements for the changes in the location of poles which will be necessary.
