CRICKET

Thistles Win Honors.
The honors in both the single and double rink competitions in the hospital of the New Brunswick branch of the Royal Canadian Curling Club were won by rinks of the Thistle Curling Club. The double rink competition was decided yesterday, which was nearly 2:30 o'clock this morning before it was decided that the single rink honors rested between two rinks of this club.

Both teams were in excellent fighting form and both went in with resolve. From the opening gong until the last moment of play, the struggle was fast and fierce. No score was gained without an effort, and no man was found wanting where play required his presence. For the first three minutes the rubber went from line to line, but it was not until A. Gaudet, university wing man, drew the puck from out a mix-up at centre ice and sent it flying to Sheldae net for the first goal that real hockey was played. The game from that time on was well fought. Occasionally the rubber found its way to college territory, but was always returned by Robidoux, who, though closely watched by his opponents, found a chance to visit the enemy's net.

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Mr. LeBlanc, who is a member of the rink, played with the opposing players and threw them into confusion more than once. One of the Sheldae club, a veteran in the game, lacked nothing of his former vigor. His timely presence at different periods saved an increase of the score. Mr. LeBlanc, Sheldae goal, did creditable work and elicited round after round of applause. He is deserving of special mention, and even recommendation to the hockey world.

Felix Martin of Moncton officiated as referee. His thorough grasp of the fine points of the game proved invaluable in representing all tendency to rough play, and thus added to the interest of the game. BASEBALL

Thorpe Not on Hand.
New York, Feb. 20.—A wild rumor was in circulation among baseball men that the Indian athlete, Jim Thorpe, had decided to quit the Giants, with whom he signed a contract several weeks ago. This was because Thorpe did not board McGraw's train at Harrisburg on Sunday night, but Secretary Foster explained that the Indian had missed the train connections and probably would follow the New York players to Martin at once. McGraw had been writing inquiries about Thorpe. It is known that several promoters have been trying to induce Thorpe to give up baseball and join an athletic combination to tour the United States. One of the promoters, according to the Sun, said the other day that he was ready to sign Thorpe and Frank Gotch, champion wrestler, to join Luther McCarty in such a tour. McCarty would box all comers in four-round bouts, while Gotch would wrestle in exhibitions, each event in the evening, while Thorpe would show his athletic football and baseball skill in the afternoon. The promoter said that this combination if made would clear \$100,000 in less than six months, and that he had guaranteed at least a third of the amount to Thorpe. The Indian's contract with the Giants for this year calls for a \$60,000 salary. Thorpe, it is said, received \$200 for taking part in the professional athletic games in Boston last Saturday night. His disappointed McGraw by failing to leave on Sunday night with Matty and other New York players for St. Louis, en route to Martin Thorpe, it was explained, passed through here from Boston early Sunday

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Attell's Come-Back.
New York, Feb. 20.—True to the declaration that he made a week ago about a desire to return to the ring, Abe Attell, former featherweight champion, packed his trunk and departed for a training camp in the Hudson. Attell figures that there are several good fights in him yet, and will go through a severe course of training to fit himself for some important battles which he has in view.

It is said that Attell's first opponent will be Olle Kirk, a St. Louis featherweight. It was against Kirk that Attell was losing two months ago when at the end of the sixth round, with two more rounds to go, he stepped to the centre of the ring and announced to the crowd that he was done as a fighter. He has not figured in a bout since that time. About a month ago Johnny Kilbane, stopped Kirk in a single round.

CHEEKERS

A Big Tournament.
The arrangements for a big tournament between the Boston and All-New England checker teams, which will take place on Washington's Birthday afternoon and evening at the American House, Boston, have been completed. So much interest has been manifested that it is believed all records for attendance will be broken.

There was a time when the Brooklyn players said they were confident of breaking the record of the Boston players of winning the big match, and the latter were just as confident of continuing such a record. However, when the final score was printed on the blackboard, much to the surprise of the Boston team they were beaten.

It was the second victory for All-New England in the big tournament, the previous one being in 1907. It is believed that the Boston players will be quickly taken advantage of by the All-New England team. The outbreak of the present time is the first that will not be less than 500 players in the match.

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

A. L. Coleman, one of the B. & A. striking engineers, was arrested yesterday in Houston, charged with short-circuiting railway telegraph wires.

The Bangor & Aroostook Railway has filed a notice with the Interstate Commerce commission cancelling all its passenger service north of Bangor, Me., on the Maine Central, B. & M. and N. Y., N. H. & I. railways, because of an alleged failure on the part of the other companies to carry out their agreements, thus causing a loss of \$75,000 a year in net revenue.

The new trial of John D. Fisher, a fisherman of Centreville, Dgby county, N. S., was dropped yesterday. He had lately returned from a hospital, and yesterday he wandered from his home towards the shore.

In the Moncton Police Court yesterday John Brown, Thomas Bourque and Adelard Arsenau were fined \$50 each for violating the Soil Act. The latter has also other charges of \$200 Act violation to face yet.

Jacob Melek, Joseph Egnot and Joseph Kojas were arranged in Sydney yesterday for the charge of murdering Ignat Melek on December 25 last. Before the court opened Kojas sent a communication to the judge stating that the other two prisoners were guilty of the crime. After receiving the communication, the judge deferred to hold the case over until today to investigate the matter further.
