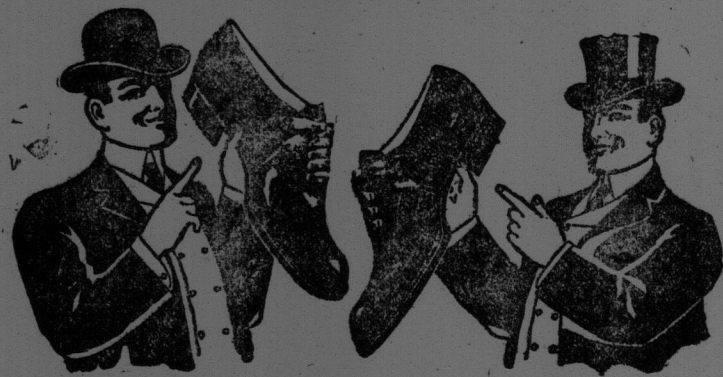

## RAILWAY EXTENSION

The New Line Across the Island  
Continent—New Elastic and  
Liberal Land Laws—Project to  
Breed Horses for British Army  
Mounts

Sydney, N. S. W., June 28.—In the course of a vigorous protest against what it describes as "the immigration muddle," the "Australasian" takes a gloomy view of the commonwealth's prospects in the matter of attracting settlers. "Many strange and mysterious things," it remarks, "are done in the name of a white Australia. The other week we were treated to the curious spectacle of a customs official asserting his right to conduct the educational test in any European language he chose, so that he could examine a Russian in Spanish, and exclude a Norwegian for his ignorance of Greek. Then we have the still more extraordinary case of Mrs. Elliott, the widow of an Englishman and the daughter of a Scotch father and a Russian mother. She, it appears, is in New Zealand, and wishes to return to her home in Ceylon, but the Union Company refuses to take her to Sydney because the Orient Company has announced that it cannot, under the alien law, take her to Sydney via Australian ports.

"Obviously this is a case that demands immediate inquiry; if such incidents are to be allowed to occur and to be noted abroad, Australia will soon cease to attract immigrants. And while these things are being done at this end, the immigration agencies at the other end appear to be blundering along in a hopelessly slipshod way which tends to make Australia an object of derision to her smarter competitor, Canada. The representatives of the various states have spent great sums of money on pamphlets, lectures, and other forms of advertisement, but have made no effective provision for shipping the would-be immigrants to Australia.

"Nearly 70,000 emigrants left Britain for this country last year; this year, according to the calculations, the figure, could easily be doubled. If Australia were in earnest about it, but it appears that shipping accommodation is not available for more than 75,000 at the outside.

Conditions Unsuitable  
The shipping companies are not willing to make arrangements for coping with a greatly-increased volume of passenger traffic, because they know the attitude of the Australian labor party towards immigration, and they fear that any day a new government may reverse the immigration policy of its state. And that is not an unusual misgiving. There is a persistent rumor in England, and in Western Australia, that the Seaden government intends to cease assisting immigration as soon as the current shipping contracts expire; and even if that rumor be unfounded, still it undoubtedly reflects the known temper of the labor party towards immigration. Wherever the labor party remains in power there will probably continue to official hostility, unless, indeed, but some less deadly, to immigration, because that party has never yet been cured of its old delusion that the wealth of a country is a fixed quantity and the greater number of mouths to consume it the smaller the share of each individual consumer.

Following the example of the federal house of representatives, who a year or two ago voted themselves a substantial increase of salary, the New South Wales labor government have brought forward a bill to raise the remuneration of members of the state legislative assembly from \$1,000 to \$2,500 per annum. The measure also provides a special allowance of \$1,250 for the leader of the opposition.

On a motion to go into committee on the proposal to introduce the bill, Mr. Wade, leader of the opposition, said he considered it most unfair that the house should be asked to accept without any discussion such a highly-controversial measure. If parliament dipped its hand into the treasury chest and took the amount proposed, without a word of approval or authority from its constituents, it would be doing wrong and would be misusing its powers. Assuming that members were entitled to a larger salary, parliament had no right to make their proposed raid upon the treasury without consultation with the people for whom members were working in the house.

The bill was introduced by thirty-five votes to fourteen, and read a first time.

The second reading, which was carried produced an animated debate.

## Railway Extension

Now that the trans-continental railway to connect Perth with Melbourne and Sydney is well under way, attention is once more being directed to the kindred scheme for the construction of a line across the continent from north to south. This is no new proposal, but the urgent necessity for the opening up of the vast northern territory has now brought it well within the region of practical politics. Unfortunately its realization is likely to involve a good deal of interstate jealousy.

Queensland and New South Wales want the extension of the existing Darwin to Pine Creek line to run in a south-easterly direction, through the pastoral areas of Queensland, straight to Sydney. But South Australia has already constructed a narrow-gauge line from Adelaide, 700 miles north, to Oodnadatta, and by the agreement with the federal government, under which the northern territory was handed over to federal administration, South Australia contends that the north-south line must be built from Darwin to Oodnadatta. The federal minister for external affairs, in whose department the northern territory is controlled, now advances yet a third possible route, to touch the northern border of Western Australia, where much good land is waiting to be opened up.

It appears to be generally recognized that through communication between north and south is an indispensable preliminary to the white settlement of the northern territory. The federal government is pledged to spare no effort to test the "white Australia" policy, and there is not much doubt that an overland railway would remove most of the objections which white men today have to taking their families to the almost empty north. For this reason alone, it is contended, the scheme cannot be much longer delayed.

The new land ordinances for the territory provide what are officially described as the most elastic and liberal land laws ever devised. The minister for external affairs states, for instance, that the government do not purpose charging any rent for agricultural and mixed farming leases for the first ten years. Further, about 5,000 leases will be picked out in different parts of the territory, which will be deemed pioneering leases. These will be granted on the understanding that no rent is to be charged for the lifetime of the person to whom the lease is granted, with a minimum of twenty-one years.
