POLICE CHECK

"JAY-WALKERS"

New York Police Report on Fruitful Cause of Auto Accidents—Traffic Mishaps Decrease.

New York, Feb. 18.—A decrease in traffic accidents has been noted since the Bureau of Public Safety of the Police Department began to function, according to reports announced by Special Deputy Police Commissioner Benson G. Collier at a meeting of the Traffic Commission at the office of Chief Magistrate William McAdoo, chairman of the committee. Magistrate McAdoo announced that a hearing on traffic matters would be held Monday afternoon at two o'clock in the Board of Estimate Chamber at City Hall.

Fourteen police lieutenants during January checked more than 6,000 violations of traffic ordinance by persons walking in the streets as well as other violations by drivers of motor vehicles. The reports show that the Safety Bureau caught 3,000 "jay walkers" or persons crossing streets in the middle of the block and 2,722 persons crossing the street diagonally, also 500 children stealing rides or "hitching on" behind moving vehicles. The crowding of streets elsewhere than at intersections is held by the police to be responsible for more accidents than any other kind of negligence.

The fourteen lieutenants of the bureau of Public Safety held 240 meetings last month in garages throughout the city, where they demonstrated to more than 11,000 chauffeurs unsafe practices of the road to be avoided.

Members of the brake squad stopped and examined the brakes on 8,706 automobiles and found 748 defective. They also made investigations of 108 accidents to determine the causes. Defendants charged with operating defective brakes were convicted in 182 cases. Those convicted received fines averaging \$22 each. One defendant was sent to jail for thirty days.

Commissioner Collier reported that the number of street accidents in 1922 was 6 per cent. less than in 1921.

Regulation caps and uniforms for licensed taxicab drivers were only one of the reforms proposed at the meeting. It was also proposed that the drivers wear sleeve bands with their license numbers displayed conspicuously.

Attending the meeting were Commissioner of Accounts David Hinchfield, Commissioner of Licenses August Glatsmeyer, Acting Health Commissioner Dr. Frank H. Monaghan and Assistant Corporation Counsel Charles I. Tarbox.

Chairman McAdoo explained that the meeting was held at the request of Mayor Hylan and announced a series of public hearings at which business, civic and other organizations and individuals would be invited to make suggestions for improving traffic conditions in the metropolis.

Commissioner Hinchfield attacked the thirty days bonding period for approximately 24,000 taxicab drivers, calling it "an unduly harsh provision."

Considerable damage was done yesterday morning to the building in South Street where the Gilbert Bent & Son conduct a wholesale grocery business when the roof collapsed from the weight of snow. NEW BRUNSWICK IS REPRESENTED

"Registered Hens" Have Become an Established Fact in Canada.

Ottawa, Feb. 18.—(Canadian Press)—The once humble domestic hen has at last come into her own, and "registered hens" are today in Canada an established fact. By admitting the hen to registration, Canada has taken a leading place in world poultry matters, as no other country in the world has previously registered poultry under national regulations.

The honor of having the first registered hen goes to Everett Howatt of Tryon, P. E. I., whose White Leghorn pullet laid 215 eggs in fifty-two consecutive weeks in the laying contest conducted at Charlottetown. Being pure bred, typical of the breed, free from disqualifications and laying a two-ounce egg, her record and the record of any hen laying 200 eggs and over under similar conditions will stand for years.

The following seven birds have also been granted registration:

1.—Barred Plymouth Rock, bred by W. E. B. Tait, Dorchester, N. B.—245 eggs.

2.—Barred Plymouth Rock, bred by J. W. Clark, Ganaville, Ont.—245 eggs.

3.—White Leghorn, bred by H. G. Hebel, Bridgeport, Ont.—288 eggs.

4.—Barred Plymouth Rock, bred by Experimental Farm, Lethbridge, Alta.—296 eggs.

5.—Barred Plymouth Rock, bred by Experimental Farm, Agassiz, B. C.—297 eggs.

6.—Barred Plymouth Rock, bred by Culpe's Poultry Farm, Berkeley, Ontario.—281 eggs.

7.—Barred Plymouth Rock, bred by Net Bros, Simcoe, Ont.—282 eggs.

Other birds have qualified and will be registered on receipt of the necessary application forms and fees.
