Power came second in volume of busi-  
ness with nearly a thousand shares  
dealt in. It was also a strong feature,  
rising 2 1/2 to 220, its former high.  
Consolidated Smelters continued its  
spectacular advance to 184, up 2, a new  
peak price for all time. Bradstreet also  
came in for considerable attention and  
rose 1-8 to 83-4. The papers were re-  
presented by Abitibi, up 1/4 to 76 1/4;  
Brompton, up 3-8 to 28 1/2; Laurentide,  
up 1/4 to 89. Western Grocers prefer-  
red gained 1 to 54. The only recession  
was suffered by the latter's issue of  
common stock, which eased 1/4 to 98-4.

## MENU HAD TO BE MUCH VARIED

Dietitian at Hospital Had  
Problem With Christ-  
mas Dinner

Carol Singing Annual Event at  
G. P. H.—May Enlarge  
Nurses' Dining Room

The problem of serving a Christmas  
dinner that sick folk and well folk  
both could enjoy was the difficult prob-  
lem for which Miss M. Stewart, dieti-  
tarian of the General Public Hospital,  
found a satisfactory solution. In her  
report to the commissioners on Christ-  
mas observance in the hospital Miss  
Stewart referred to the serving of the  
Christmas dinner for the nurses, for  
the staff, for the general patients, for  
the diabetics, whose food had to be  
carefully weighed and given in correct  
proportions, and for other patients  
whose diet also had to be carefully cal-  
culated.

The hospital was very nicely de-  
corated and the Women's Hospital Aid  
arranged for the Christmas tree in the  
children's ward. Some of the Aid's jolly  
day gifts and the Aid's Christmas cards  
were sent to the patients on Christmas  
Eve. On Christmas morning the nurses  
found the dietitian's department had  
provided a tartan stocking with goodies  
for each nurse. An innovation this year  
was carol singing in the hospital ro-  
tunda by the nurses on Christmas  
morning. It was so greatly enjoyed that  
it will be made an annual proceeding.

### CHRISTMAS DINNER

When the Christmas dinner was  
served for the patients the diet kitchen  
sent its greeting card of a sprig of pine  
on a card with an original verse for  
every tray.  
The nurses' Christmas dinner was  
served at 12:30 and M. E. Agar, chair-  
man, Mrs. J. V. McLellan and J. King  
Killey of the commissioners were pre-  
sent. In a brief speech after the dinner  
Mr. Agar said that he hoped it would  
be possible to have the nurses' dining  
room enlarged before long. He also re-  
ferred feelingly to the death of Dr.  
Thomas Walker who had presided at  
the nurses' dinner on many occasions.  
Miss M. Murdoch, superintendent of  
nurses and Mr. Killey also spoke brief-  
ly.

For the Christmas supper a special  
extra was ice cream which was the gift  
of a local dairy.

About 800 meals were served during  
Christmas day in the General Public  
Hospital.

## BRANCHES OF ROYAL BANK NUMBER 905

Annual Statement Shows Fine  
Gains in Business of  
Institution

In the annual statement of The Royal  
Bank of Canada for the fiscal year end-  
ing November 30, a record is shown, a  
result of this progressive institution. Total  
assets have now increased to \$788,478,432,  
placing the Royal in the position of  
being the second largest bank on this  
continent in points of assets, exceeded  
only by the National City Bank of New  
York, the largest in the U. S.  
The assets show a gain of over \$200,  
000,000 for the year, and while half the  
increase may be attributed to the pur-  
chase of the Union Bank of Canada and  
the Bank of Central and South Amer-  
ica, the balance is the result of the  
growth in the general business of the  
bank. The Royal Bank now has a chain  
of 905 branches, and of this number 779  
are situated throughout Canada, en-  
abling it to serve every section of the  
country.  
Liquid, or immediately available as-  
sets stand at \$398,103,935, equal to 50.3  
per cent. of liabilities to the public,  
while cash and cash balances are \$158,  
144,447, equivalent to 20.0 per cent. of

counts in Canada increased to \$190,854,  
642, as compared with \$148,699,255 at  
the end of last year, while the total of

\$227,225,356 a year ago.  
As a result of the extensive organ-  
ization built up, deposits have shown  
the surprising gain of \$180,000,000.  
GROWTH IN EARNINGS.  
The profit and loss account shows that  
earnings were well above the pre-  
vious year, and the sum of \$1,249,435  
was carried forward. Profits for the  
year amounted to \$1,081,028, up from  
\$3,878,976.
