Paris, July 10.—Can Irene Castle, matchmaker for her friends, save her own romance? Or has it gone the rocky road that leads to the divorce court?

A divorce petition formally filed in a Paris Court in the name of Mrs. Irene Castle Treman was later denied by the famous dancer, who declared she had not authorized the filing. It is said the arrival of her husband on the Atlantic a few days ago brought about a reconciliation.

Later, finding dining with her husband on the Bois de Boulogne, she said she was tired of being asked whether she was going to seek a divorce, and would not talk to reporters. She had previously given out the information through her maid that she had gone to Dr. Deauville to spend the weekend with her husband.

Irene Castle married Robert Treman of Ithaca, socially prominent and immensely wealthy from his holdings in the Treman-King Company, manufacturers of automobile accessories, in 1919.

After Vernon Castle's death in an airplane accident, Irene Castle posed for a beautiful statue which was placed on his grave as a memorial. Irene Castle was the "dear ex-machina" in the recent marriage of her friend, Nya McMein, the illustrator, to John Baragwanath.

NO SLANDER DAMAGES FOR MCGILL PROFESSOR

Montreal, July 10.—The court of King's bench, appeal side, has confirmed a judgment of the superior court sitting at Quebec, which held that Prof. J. L. Morin of McGill, was not entitled to damages for slander from the action taken by Morin two days before he was arrested on the complaint of Walter on a charge of poisoning the latter's well at his summer residence at Elgin Road, Lislet County. He was later acquitted of this and other charges in the courts.
