WARNS EXCURSIONISTS

AGAINST BUYING HERE

U. S. Customs Officer Issues
Ruling Regarding Taking
Goods Over Line.

Port Townsend, Aug. 6.—As announced
in a circular letter issued this week, Col-
lector F. C. Harper, of the Puget Sound
customs district, prohibits purchases by
American excursionists in Victoria. Dur-
ing the pending rate war large crowds
went to Victoria purchasing Canadian
goods under the tariff act of July 24th,
1907, much to the detriment of the mer-
chants on the Sound. Mr. Harper has
decided that this does not apply to people
who go abroad for the purpose of pur-
chasing certain goods obtainable cheaper
in the British Isles
