Covering the period named, Australia paid direct contributions to the British Admiality, who in return maintained a squadron of war vessels in Australian waters at a yearly cost of three times the sum paid a yearly cost of three times the sum part by the Australian government. A fine way of relieving the British taxpayer this. Then when Australia could boast of a population of 4,650,000, a Federal revenue of about \$96,000,000, and a foreign trade of \$760,000,000, she found herself ready and capable of founding steel shipbuilding plants, of constructing dockyards, of maintaining navai stations, of building or buying Dreadnoughts and other types of war vessels, and also of finding ampli volunteers to take full charge of the sam after receiving training; in short, of set-ting up a most promising naval system of her own. The Dominion of Canada finds herself in this year of Our Lord, 1913, with a population of nearly 8 millions, with a Federal revenue of about 200 millions, increasing at the rate of nearly three mil-lions a month, with a foreign trade which, at the end of the curren year, will reach \$1,250,000,000, with bank deposits double those of Australia, and with Clearing Houses counting their hand lings by the billions—yet we are told by Mr. Borden and his followers that Canada cannot do in less than fifty years what Australia is now accomplishing with such Australia is now accomplishing with such case and celerity! In fifty years Canada may have a population of forty millions, with a revenue of a billion dollars or more annually, and then, and not till then, will she be able to do the work Australia is now doisg, according to Mr. Borden and his followers. 
