The total height is forty-five feet, width twenty-six feet and depth fourteen feet. There are four enormous pairs of bellows, blown by French treaches, which require four men to handle them. Patent vacuum pallets overcome the tremendous wind pressure rendering the touch pliable and easy, giving the organist every facility for combining and controlling the immense masses of tone. The chime of thirty-four bells is also a feature of the instrument, and will be used at marriage ceremonies. They are struck by piano action, and are capable of ringing in all the changes.

The audience included not only names prominent in Catholic work in the city, but known in the churches of other denominations. Mr. Chas. O'Connor of dedicating the magnificent new St. Patrick's Cathedral of New York, the finest ecclesiastical edifice in America, proved one of the most significant events in the history of Catholicity in the United States. For thirty years the labors and anxious expectations of Archbishop Hughes and Cardinal Mc. Closkey have been directed to this end, so that to-day the Catholics of New York have the happiness of worshipping in a temple worthy of their own liberality, and of the zeal of the devoted prelates who reared it.

of the new Cathedral was laid with imposing ceremonies, on the 15th of August, the feast of the Assumption, 1858. The foundations of the Cathedral rest on a bed of solid rock, in which excavations therefor had to be made. At the normal level of the surrounding grounds rest a chisel dressed base course of granite. From this springs a pure Gothic superstructure, similar in architecture to the style obtaining in Europe during the thirteenth and fourteenth centuries. Like the Cathedrals at Amiens, Reims, and Cologne, St. Patrick's is free from the heaviness and over ornamentation which are the distinguishing characteristics of ecclesiastical edifices of previous date. The main entrance, on Fifth avenue, is 12 feet deep, 30 feet wide and embowered in carved devices.
