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

protection against fire as any town of its size in the dominion. Natural facil-ities render the putting in of a water system quite an easy matter. The springs from whence the water is to be taken are situated nearly 200 feet above the level of the village, so that neither a stand pipe nor a fire engine will be necessary to throw the water over the highest buildings in the village. The head springs are situated on D. E. Morgan's farm. These are to be connected by wooden pipes-two and a half inch-hemlock, and will termin-ate in a union with a 2 1-2 inch wrought iron pipe, which will carry the water about half a mile, to a reservoir built on a knoll-commonly known as "the sugar lcaf"-on D. H. Keswick's farm, about sixty rods back, and 113 feet above the village. This reservoir will measure 37 feet 6 inches by 45 feet 6 inches, and 12 feet deep, and capacity holding 100,000 gallons. It will be constructed of spruce and hemlock, the walls being six inches thick. An ex-cavation six feet deep is being made

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
