HIGHER FIRE INSURANCE RATES The board of fire underwriters have decided to increase the rates in parts of the city. While the north beckney to increase the rates in some parts of the city. While the north and districts will be principally subject to the increased tariff, it is under-stood that an advance was determined upon for Brussels street and west of it. Other portions of the city will also be taxed a higher rate of premium, but this will apply only where special conditions exist. The north and sec-tions are affected because of their op-position to the underwriters' bill to amend the regulations respecting new wooden buildings. The increase will be a half per cent., and will apply only to the congested wooden districts. For example, a building like St. Lake's church, which is isolated, will not come under the new schedule. West side portions which are included in the mew fire district law, will not be sub-jected to the increase tariff. The new dariff, it is expected, will go into effect July 1.
