SUNDAY TRAGEDIES.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., April 14.—An automobile containing William Evans, Superintendent of the Harbours, and Parker Mill, of Fall River, and his family, ran down and seriously injured John Ealvey, a ten year old child, on Wickenden street today. The child is said to have stepped suddenly from the curbstone directly in front of the machine. He suffered fractures of the skull and jaw and is not expected to recover. Mr. Evans furnished bail in the sum of \$1,000 on the charge of assault and the hearing of the case was set for April 25.

A RIGAS, Russia, April 13.—There was a serious mutiny in the local prison today. Thirty-three inmates attacked and overcame the superintendent and the warden of the establishment. Troops were then sent and the conditions were such that they had to fire. Seven of the mutineers were killed and 12 were wounded. The superintendent of the prison was badly beaten.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., April 13.—A special from Mexico City, Mexico, says:—One wing of the city jail collapsed today entombing 20 prisoners, two of whom were killed. Every one confined in the wing was hurt, and five fatally.

NORTH ADAMS, Mass., April 14.—James Walley, 27, for many years an engraver at the Windsor Print Works in this city, committed suicide today by shooting. Walley was 29 years old and unmarried. It is believed to have been dependent on the failure of the management of the Print works to re-engage him, when the company started up recently after a two years shut down.

KEY WEST, Fla., April 14.—An explosion which occurred on the dredger George W. Allen, engaged in extensive work on the Florida coast, R. R., at Key West, early today caused the death of two Spaniards, Jose Ando and Manuel Agrac, and injured eight others.

Those injured were asleep at the time of the explosion. The steam blew out a partition on the dredger, which was not otherwise damaged.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., April 13.—An express train on the New York, New Haven and Hartford R. R. killed a man at Stamford this afternoon who, according to the engineer, deliberately jumped in front of the engine. His clothes bore no identifying mark, neither did those of a man killed by a train at Windsor, on the Hartford division earlier in the day.

PITTSBURG, Pa., April 14.—Robert M. Crowe, a nephew of H. C. McGilowry, president of the Union Trust Company of this city, who shot himself in the abdomen while in a box watching a performance at a local theatre last Wednesday afternoon, died at a hospital today. Crowe was 23 years old and a member of a prominent family. The shooting, which almost caused a panic in the theatre, is attributed to financial difficulties.

ALEXANDRIA, La., April 14.—Three men were killed and one probably fatally injured is the result of what is believed to be the work of train wreckers at Chenyville, thirty miles southeast of here on the Texas and Pacific R. R. early this morning when a west-bound passenger train plunged into an open switch while running at a high speed. The wreckage caught fire.

NEW YORK, N. Y., April 14.—Police- man George M. Vincenzo, a young Italian, were shot and fatally wounded by Salvatore Governale, in a running fight which began in Washington Square and ended in a tenement in West Third street. Scholer died soon after he was shot. Governale immediately after his arrest was hurried to the hospital where he was identified by the three dying men.

MALDEN, Mass., April 14.—Medical Examiner E. G. Holt decided today that a shock of electricity caused the death of Miss Anna W. Greenwood, who was found dead last evening sitting beside a telephone instrument at her home. Contact made by the young woman's body with telephone and electric light circuits, as she was in the act of ringing the telephone and turn-

FREDERICTON, April 14.—Bishop Richardson addressed the college Y. M. C. A. at the University this afternoon. The fee in the river still remains quite solid owing to the recent cold weather. A few days sun, however, will make a considerable change.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected "here-with under one of the following plans: (1) At least six months' residence upon cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of the homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.
