A VOTE FOR COERCION.

The division of the house of commons on the coercion clause of the so-called autonomy bill contains no surprises unless the member for the Yukon was expected to vote for the Borden amendment.

LONDON, April 29.—The chancellor of the exchequer alluding in his budget speech to the fact that there was a decrease in the revenue from the taxes on spirits, declared his belief that this was due to increased sobriety rather than for any temporary reasons.
