OPENING OF THE RAILWAY.—Yesterday the iron horse passed for the first time over the whole line of Railway from this city to Moncton.

Seville, Disbrow, Thornton, Swagby, and McGhee, &c.—Colonial Presbyterian.

DEATH OF CHIEF JUSTICE HALIBURTON.—We regret to learn that the hon. Judge in British North America stood higher in the estimation of his fellow colonists as the possessor of judicial learning, and none was more eminent for strict integrity and unerring impartiality than the late Sir Brenton Haliburton.

The death of this venerable Judge will occasion a vacancy on the Bench of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia. This we understand will be filled up by the Honorable William Young.—The promotion of this gentleman will render it necessary for the issue of a writ authorizing the election of a member of the Assembly for the County of Cumberland, which County he now represents. We take it for granted therefore, that another scene of jubilee, bubble, toil and trouble, will soon present itself at the adjoining County in the sister Province.—Nbr.

The Joint Committee of the citizens and the Common Council are making good progress with the arrangements for the reception of the Prince of Wales in this City. The Trades and Fire Companies have agreed to turn out, and with the Militia form a procession on the occasion of the arrival of His Royal Highness. It is ascertained that he will land in a boat at Reed's Point, and will be received there by a guard of honour composed of detachments from the several Volunteer Militia Companies. He will then proceed in an open carriage along Prince William Street, which will be lined on either side by the trades, &c., to the residence provided for him. On entering Mrs. Chipman's grounds he will be welcomed by the children belonging to the various Sunday Schools in the City, and Portland.—Protestants and Roman Catholics together, singing the national anthem. After a short stay at this point he will proceed to the Court House, and there view the procession, which will pass from Reed's Point through Britain or St. James' and other intermediate streets. It is not yet known whether a levee will be held or not, but a wish has been expressed by the Joint Committee that the citizens may have this opportunity of paying their personal respects to His Royal Highness. In the evening there will be an illumination, fireworks, and probably a torch light procession of the firemen.

We have given a mere outline of the arrangements in progress, in order to satisfy the inquiries addressed to us. In a few days, at all events by the beginning of next week, an official programme will be published.—Church Witness.
