

News Summary.

Late despatches state that four has advanced twenty-five cents a barrel throughout Ontario. The Kingston, Ont., car works have completed a contract for 300 flat cars for the Intercolonial Railway. It is sought to incorporate a company in Charlottetown to make peat-moss stable-bedding for sale and export. Several cases of leprosy are reported at Englishtown, Victoria, B. C. The disease has already proved fatal to one person. The St. Croix Soap Manufacturing Company have just completed the foundation for a three story addition to their factory buildings. The Grand Manan cable is to be repaired shortly and a new cable laid to Whitehead. The Newfield will be employed in the service. A company has recently been organized in Halifax to work the extensive marble deposits at Marble Mountain near West Bay, Cape Breton. Large quantities of mackerel are still being caught in St. Mary's Bay, and are being shipped to Boston by steamers leaving Digby and Yarmouth. The increase in the traffic earnings of the Canadian Pacific Railway for the week ending August 14, showed an increase of \$21,000 over those for the same period of the previous year. Six or more British farm delegates have been invited to Canada with a view of promoting immigration. There will be three representatives of leading agricultural societies. They sailed from Liverpool, Aug. 22nd. Mr. Nathan Sweeney, of Pleasant Lake, Yarmouth, raised a lamb this season with five legs and six feet. It has three fore legs, and two feet on one hind leg. He has sold it to Austin & Stone of the Nickolon, Boston, for a snug little sum. It is estimated that in all between 175,000,000 feet of logs were rafted down the St. John this spring. Of this quantity, it is stated, fully 50,000,000 feet were old logs hung up, and there was between 125,000,000 and 130,000,000 of this season's cut. For the past week the bay and harbor have been full of what are called Silver Haddock, and good catches of these fish have been secured by several parties. They are said to be very palatable both when used fresh and, when slightly salted. It is reported here in political circles that the Earl of Aberdeen will succeed Lord Stanley as Governor General of Canada, and that the principal object of his visit is to study the habits and customs of the people and view the land he is to be called upon to govern. The St. Andrew's Ice men are now engaged in shipping large quantities of this article. Chamookick has achieved a reputation in the New York market and is much sought after. But the prices have not yet reached the point to which it was expected they would get by this time. The St. John's Lime Company, which has been carrying on the manufacturing of lime at Marble Mountain, has just completed the construction of their second patent draw kiln. This company is producing 1,500 tons per week, and as the demand for its product is good, the company will erect more kilns at an early date.—North Sydney Herald. The Marine Department at Ottawa has been notified that the lighthouse on Point Rick, west coast of Newfoundland, was totally destroyed by fire last Friday. The light was erected by the Dominion government in 1871 and has proved of great service to steamers utilizing the Straits of Belle Isle and from England. It will hardly be possible to reconstruct the lighthouse before next spring. A carload of horses arrived at Springfield Thursday evening from Parrsboro, for use in the mines. About 400 men, who are now in Springfield, are going to work and men who have left the town are returning. Work has been sent to Pugwash, Cape Breton and other places by under manager Swift, requesting the men to return to work. The coal pickers went to work Friday. The managers hope to have everything in full working order by the middle of the week. Crop reports covering the province of Ontario, state that fall and spring wheat, barley, oats, peas and hay are above the average in yield per acre and in quality. Harvesting is now in process throughout the province, and much grain has already been gathered. Parties coming east from Manitoba say that no adequate idea of the enormous crops of the Northwest can be gained except by seeing them. Grain of every kind will prove an immense yield if harvesting weather is favorable. In the recent report of the Insurance Commissioner of Massachusetts, we find these words: "Insurance that does not insure is dear at any price. Insurance that costs beyond the needs of safety is an unjust burden. That system is the best which combines safety with the minimum of cost." Wm. T. Standen, New York, another high authority, in a report on the system of the Dominion Safety Fund Life Association, St. John, N. B., says:—"It combines the least possible cost with the greatest degree of safety." Ship-building is brisk on the Parrsboro shore. Mr. Barnhill is building a woodboat at Two Rivers. At Sand River, E. I. White is building a schooner. At Apple River a heavy milling business is being done and an immense quantity of lumber being sawed. At Advocate Harbour there are two vessels being built. At Spencer's Island the Messrs. Eaton are building a large vessel. At Eatonville a vessel was launched last week. At Ward's Brook a schooner is under construction. At Hatchford's River, Capt. Kerr has a schooner well advanced. At Diligent River another schooner is being built and still another at Brookville.
