The Vacancy On  
The Hospital Board

Matter Has Not Been Discussed by Woman's Hospital Aid or Local Council of Women—Mrs. J. Verner McLellan and Mrs. R. Duncan Smith Mentioned.

"In answer to an inquiry regarding an article in an evening paper yesterday in which Mrs. R. Duncan Smith and Mrs. J. Verner McLellan were mentioned as candidates for the vacancy on the Board of Hospital Commissioners with the further mention of Mrs. R. D. Smith as being favored by the Women's Hospital Aid, Mrs. McLellan, vice-president of the Aid, stated that this matter has never come up for consideration at any general or executive meeting of the Women's Hospital Aid. Mrs. Travers, secretary of the Aid, stated that it is a matter for the commissioners to decide for themselves. No meeting of the Aid was held yesterday.

It is understood that no recommendation of any person has passed the Local Council of Women which organization have been most active in urging that a woman be appointed on the Board of the General Public Hospital.

It was stated by a prominent member of the Local Council of Women last evening that while the Council would be pleased to be consulted by the Board of Commissioners regarding the appointment, recommendation would have to come from a general meeting of the Council.

It was decided at last evening's meeting of the Young Women's Patriotic Association, held in the G. W. P. A. rooms, that no meetings will be held in July and August, but that the September meeting shall be a rally, at which plans shall be made for a dance. The work of securing members for the Anti-Tuberculosis Association was taken up as the summer task of the members, each pledging herself to get as many members as possible and then swell the fund for the association.

The resignations of Miss Stella Allingham and Miss de Soyres from the executive were regrettably accepted, and the secretary was asked to write Miss Allingham, a valued member of the Association, wishing her every happiness.

A report was given of the tea held for Miss de Soyres, and her letter of thanks for the gift presented her on her departure for Montreal was read.

A letter of thanks from Captain J. B. Mackay, managing director of the Anglo-Canadian Picture Plays, was read, conveying thanks to the Y. W. P. A. for their assistance in making the showing of a British film in St. John a success. It was reported that the Y. W. P. A., at the request of the president of the Women's Canadian Club, had given their services as ushers for the meeting held in honor of General Sir Arthur Currie.

A resolution moved by Miss Beatrice Prink, seconded by Miss Bertha Boyer, was passed stating that the Y. W. P. A. strongly supported British and Canadian motion pictures.
