Mr. Huntington: In this country we have the ability, the talent, the technology, the universities, the people and the will to do it. But we must move our attitudes into the twentieth century. Those of us in organized groups must stop demanding more from the system than the system has to offer. If the private sector is to survive and blossom again, the managers and owners in the private sector will have to realize that those enterprises are there to serve employees, suppliers and consumers. Our tax laws must deliver us back to addressing tax costs, not profits. If we are to move into the area of free trade, a country like Canada can no longer continue under a customs union which favours one part at the expense of others. But we can address that if we get our act together and move on proper, creative, new economic thrusts which can take us into the twenty-first century.

That is where it is at, and that is what our young people coming out of our schools and universities today want from this government, from this Parliament. That is what we must deliver. The challenge is ours, yet we play around in stupid, little, narrow, political games, trying to knife each other when the country is going right down the drain with these socialist, old-fashioned, Keynesian, new, international world order policies and thrusts. Look at Britain. It nationalized industry after industry. The payrolls of some of those manufacturing industries were larger than their gross revenues, and they are finished. That country has had the hard struggle of returning those out to bottom-line management. I keep coming back to what Professor Florey had to say. The government controls the private sector. No one controls the public sector. So why continue with these nationalization policies? I say to Your Honour and others on that side, vote against this motion and you vote against the lowering of interest rates, which we can do as a country if we determine our own style.

Vote against this motion, and you are voting against a stronger dollar. All of these things are the key elements to a lower rate of inflation which is the future of our kids and of our country.
