Support for crosswalks

After a delay of several months Mississauga councillors have agreed in principle to a scheme for pedestrian crosswalks for the town.

But Acting Mayor Lou Parsons said this week that action may be taken to limit crosswalks to narrow roads with slow moving traffic.

He noted that routes like Dundas Street would be unsuitable for the pedestrian walks. "That would be far too.

wide for a crosswalk. A motorist wouldn't be able to see a pedestrian on a far curb if it was snowing hard." Mississauga deputy police chief Doug Burrows has said crosswalks are suitable only on narrow roads which accommodate high volumes of slow-moving traffic. Parsons felt there would

be danger in not installing the walks. "We have so many lines on our roads that some people think they're crosswalks and automatically stick out their

arms to cross." He said the nearness to Toronto had attuned people to crosswalks. Council has delayed a committee decision on the


