At Toronto, January 7, 1911.

Dear Mr . Reynolds,

It is most kind of you to have thought of giving me the opportunity of meeting with Mr. Stimson and of talking with him about our labour legislation. I wish very much I were free to accept your invitation for either Wednesday or Thursday evening, but, as I have just wired you, I doubt if it is going to be possible for me to get away for any meetings of the Federation. The most I can hope for is to be present on Friday or Saturday. On account of so many of our ministers being away, I have been assigned the task of looking after one or two bills which will come up on the day the House opens, which is Wednesday. I cannot hope, therefore, to get away before Thursday and I have had to write Mr. Easley asking him not to count on my being on hand at all.

I regret that owing to the fact that I have been speaking during the last two or three days in Western Ontario, I did not receive your letter until reaching Toronto this afternoon. It had been forwarded to await by arrival here.
