Exports from Canada to United Kingdom: No separate statistics.

Canadian Production (year ending March 31, 1931):

In the Bureau of Statistics Report, fruit pulps are included in fruit "Otherwise Preserved".

Canadian Potential Production: Approximately 50% increase.

British Tariff:

Without sugar:	Free	-	25%

Note: In addition to above, certain fruits such as plums, prunes, green gages, damsons and mirabels take an extra general tariff of 7s. per cwt.

Remarks:

Prior to 1929, the production of fruit pulp was not sufficient for our own needs but in 1930 and 1931 larger surplus was accumulated, particularly in strawberry, raspberry, loganberry and plum. Our records show that Canadian strawberries to the amount of 3,579,572 lbs. valued at \$525,500.00 was used for jam and strawberry pulp in 1931. There are no records for other fruit pulps.
