

*In other Provinces.*

In the Provinces of New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, Manitoba, and in the North West and Yukon Territories, the coroner's jurisdiction is determined and established by the order in council which appoints that coroner in conformity with the provisions of the statutes of these provinces and territories.

As to Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia, the justices of the peace are given authority by the statutes to act as coroners in the absence of that officer. In Prince Edward Island, it is the coroner whose residence is the nearest to the place where the death occurred who has jurisdiction to hold an inquest. And should that coroner be prevented from acting, either through illness, absence, personal interest, or otherwise, it is the coroner who lives the next nearest to the place where the body lies, who holds the inquest. (P. E. I., Act of 1855.)

As to the North West Territories, the Revised Statutes of Canada, cap. 50, sec. 82, enact that besides the coroners who are
