#### BUYING CANADIAN PREFERENCE

Lord Stanley Says It Wouldn't Be Fair to Home Manufacturers. London, April 20—(C. A. P.)—Lord Stanley of Alderly, in a letter to the Westminster Gasette, on the Colonial

Stanley of Alderly, in a letter to the Westminster Gasette, on the Colonial preference says he fears that in the consideration of a policy of Colonial streference, and its advantages, too much attention has been paid to the question of food and raw materials. His lordship asks should we be prepared in se important an article as wood pulp to limit the paper-making supplies from other countries in order to encourage Canada.

In 1992 we imported £2,500,000 worth of weed pulp, of which £648,000 came from Canada. A dire per cent duty on wood pulp other than Canadian-would raise the revenue ninety thousand a year and give a subsidy of about £30,000 a year to Canada. This stimulus to Canadian trade might cause Canada to send us half our total supply, then our revenue would fail to £60,000 per year and Canadian pulp makers would gain £60,000 a year.

If we taxed wood pulp we should have to tax other paper-making materials such as rage, esparto fibre and ather materials imported to the value of about £920,000 in 1903. Thus the whole trade of the paper makers would be disturbed and the cost of materials inhanced for the purpose of buying a Canadian preference.
