SKETCH OF MR. A. G. DOUGHTY, THE NEW DOMINION ARCHIVIST.

Gentleman of Great Literary Attainments Succeeds the Late Douglas Brynmor, LL.D.—The National Records to be Reorganized—No System of Preserving Papers and Documents of Great Value Properly at Present in Operation.

Mr. Arthur G. Doughty, M.A. (Carlisle), who is to be appointed Dominion Archivist in place of the late Douglas Brynmor, LL.D., is an Englishman, and has only been in Canada about twelve years. Born at Maidenhead on March 22, 1860, he was educated at the Lord Eldon School, London, and afterwards at New Inn Hall, Oxford, and at Dickinson College, Carlisle, where he took his M.A. degree in 1890. He at one time contemplated entering the Church of England, and was for a time associated with All Hallows' Mission, Southwark, London. When he went to Montreal, he was for a number of years connected with the Legal and Commercial Exchange, but his literary tastes led to his determining to devote his life to literature rather than to commerce. He published Tennyson's "In Memoriam" in shorthand, and later wrote the libretto of a comic opera, "Bonnie Prince Charlie," which, however, was not a success.

Mr. Doughty was one of the charter members of the Sir John A. Macdonald Club of Montreal, acted as secretary for Sir Donald Smith when he contested the St. Antoine Division of Montreal in 1891, and was always identified with the Conservative party until after the return of the Liberal party to power in 1896. In fact, he wrote the ode which was read at the unveiling of the Montreal monument to Sir John A. Macdonald in 1895.

When the late Hon. H. T. Duffy became Provincial Treasurer of Quebec he appointed Mr. Doughty his private secretary and he held that position until Mr. Duffy's death. Since then he has been assistant librarian of the Legislature of Quebec. Last year Mr. Doughty published "The Siege of Quebec," in six volumes, and has received therefore high praise from many critics. Mr. Doughty is a Fellow of the Royal Colonial Institute.

The Government has approved of the complete reorganization of the archives branch. It is a curious fact that the reorganization of records and

historical documents has been carried on in three departments. This state of affairs prevailed for many years prior to the advent of the present Government. The archives branch of the Department of Agriculture was established about the year 1872. The late Mr. Douglas Brynmor was the first archivist, and the work of these two branches has been of an identical character, and to some extent has been duplicated. This was made evident on one occasion in a rather costly way. One of the branches went to considerable expense to have certain documents copied in London, while all the time the originals were in the possession of the other branch. In addition to the two custodians already alluded to, the Clerk of the Privy Council has had charge of some documents. In many of the departments there are papers of great value not only to the State, but to the individual, involving as they do questions of title and proprietary rights.

It is only in the archives branch of the Department of Agriculture that these papers are properly classified and open to the inspection of the general public. Under the circumstances Hon. Sydney Fisher has recommended to his colleagues the consolidation of the records branches and the collection of volumes and documents having any historical value under one roof, a recommendation in which they fully concurred. In 1897 a commission was appointed to examine into the state of the public documents, and after investigation made a series of recommendations. These form the basis of the action upon which the Government have now decided. The papers and documents in the records branch of the Department of Agriculture, in the records branch of the State Department, and in the Privy Council Department will all be brought together under the care of Mr. Doughty, whose title will be "Dominion Archivist and Keeper of the Records." From the other departments will be assembled papers relating to the war of 1812, the rebellion of 1837, the Northwest rebellion, the Behring seal fishery dispute and other international disputes and other matters. Such other papers and documents as the Government may from time to time see fit are also to be placed in the custody of the Dominion Archivist and Keeper of Records.

AUSTRALIA'S CAPITAL

Tamut Again Formally Declared the Site of New Provincial Capital.

The Federal House of Representatives at Melbourne has reintroduced in the Bill fixing the site of the new Federal capital. The site was rejected by the Federal Senate on the 15th ult., in favor of Bombala, while only a week previously



the House of Representatives declared for Tamut.

Tamut was originally chosen because of its admirable situation. It is a pretty little town some 264 miles from Sydney, on the River Tamut, a tributary of the Murrumbidgee. The district round Tamut embraces the richest agricultural land in the country. Its cereals are especially fine, season changes being of the slightest at this favored spot. The population of Tamut is about 6,000, with an area of holdings totalling 500,000 acres. It is rapidly increasing in importance as a wine growing centre.

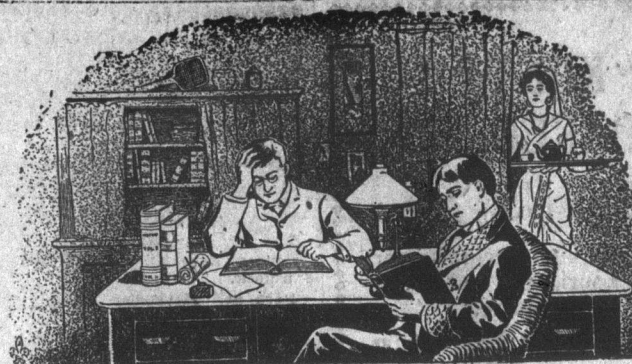
Bombala is the leading township of the Monaro district on the Bombala River, 319 miles from Sydney, and is a great grazing centre. Gold mining is also carried on a few miles from the town, and there is a big trade in valuable timber for building purposes. Stream tin has also been discovered, and is now being worked with good commercial results. Lead, silver, and copper are also plentiful, and it is this richness in mineral wealth which is believed to have swayed the Senate in its choice of sites for the capital.
