DE LA SALLE INSTITUTE COMMENCEMENT.

On Tuesday, November 10th, the Commencement Exercises of De La Salle Institute took place at 3.30 p.m., the occasion being honored by the presence of His Grace, Archbishop McEvay and a large audience of the priests and people of the city interested in affairs of the schools.

A feature of the entertainment was an oral address by Master Fred Boland, who welcomed His Grace for his kindly interest in being present, and gave a brief outline of the conditions and workings of the classes. In the course of the address it was stated that whereas at the close in June last there were but ninety pupils, at the opening in September there were one hundred and twenty-six.

Rev. J. E. Crinon, pastor of Paris, died at St. Joseph's Hospital, Oshawa, Saturday, Nov. 7th. The remains were brought to Paris Monday following, where burial took place. Mass of Requiem was sung by Rev. Father Becker, assisted by Rev. Father Cummings, as deacon, and Rev. Father Corcoran (Teeswelder), as sub-deacon. Rev. Father Weidner, master of ceremonies.
