## DAIRY PRODUCE

Continued large receipts of both butter and cheese make a further decline in prices imminent. Although quotations have been maintained with difficulty the past week, no actual reductions have occurred. Creamery prices are quoted at 2½¢ to 3½¢; solids, 1½¢ to 2½¢; dairy prints, 1½¢ to 1½¢; inferior, 1½¢ to 2½¢; dairy prints, 1½¢ to 1½¢; twine, 14½¢; new, large, 12½¢; twine, 1½¢.

## LIVE STOCK

Shipments of cattle to the Union Stock Yards a week ago to-day numbered 2,000 as compared with 3,000 the Monday previous. Bidding was brisk and the yards were soon cleared. Exporters were quoted 10 cents higher than the week previous. This was scarcely to be expected, as cables from Liverpool showed 50 cents. There was, however, a strong local demand from country jobs which made competition for export cattle keen. Competition was increased by buyers from Montreal and Winnipeg. Butcher cattle were also in strong demand. A few choice loads selling for 85¢.

The market continued steady through out the week on rather light receipts. On the coving market a new feature was the sale of a handful of picked steers at 10 to 10 ½¢. On this market competition was keen for butcher cattle. The top price averaging 85.00 and a few selling at 86¢. Feeders were in brisk demand but few were offered. Quotations: Choice, as follows: Export cattle, choice, \$5.00 to \$6.00; 45 to 50 lbs; bulls, \$5 to \$5.20; butcher cattle, choice, \$4.50 to \$5.00; common to medium, \$4.75 to \$5.00; 45 to 50 lbs; feeding steers, \$5.25 to \$5.50; stockers, \$4.25 to \$5.25; canners, \$2 to \$2.50.

Milk cows were in good demand, but quotations were scarcely as high as the week previous. Choice milkers sold at \$60 to \$80, and from that down to \$30 according to quality; springers, \$25 to \$40. Supplies of calves were not very limited, all offering being taken at fair figures. Ewes are quoted at \$4.75 to \$5.25; guinea and culls, \$3 to \$3.50; spring lambs, \$4.25 to \$5.25; 10 to 15 lb. yearling lambs, \$6 to \$6.75. Calves are quoted at \$3.50 to \$5.50.

Ewes are again back to the 45 mark. Receipts the past week were stinted.

At Montreal, cattle have been stronger the past week and prices show an average advance of 15¢ a cwt. Choice steers are selling at \$5.00 a cwt, \$5.50 to \$6.25; fair, \$5 to \$5.25; and common, \$4.25 to \$5.47. As high as \$5.50 to \$5.75 is being paid for choice bulls. Lower grades sell down to \$4 to \$4.50. Junior cows of best quality sell at \$5.25 to \$5.50, and inferior ones at \$3.75 to \$4.

Offerings of sheep and lambs were light and the market continued steady at last week's quotations. Old sheep sold at \$2 to \$3 and spring lambs at \$5 to \$8 each according to size and quality.

## EXPORT BUTTER AND CHEESE

Montreal, Saturday, May 27.—Prices in the country for cheese are still declining, and this past week has seen the lowest prices paid for Ontario cheese for some time, it being over two years since 10½¢ was generally accepted for finest Brookville and other good Ontario cheese. This was the ruling price paid for the cheese offered this week at the various boards in Eastern Ontario, although more money was paid in the western half of the province, notably at Belleville, where a large proportion of the offerings for food 10½¢. The market generally, however, is lower than it was last week, and is likely to go still lower unless there is a speedy improvement in the demand from Great Britain. Every week so far this season there has been an accumulation of stock here, indicating that the demand is not equal to the supply, and hence it becomes stronger enough to absorb the receipts, prices must come down to the level that will bring on sufficient demand from the other side to accomplish this. The receipts of cheese into Montreal this week amounted to almost 30,000 boxes, the quantity being exactly the same as that received during the corresponding week a year ago. Next week's receipts should show an increase over last year.

The market for butter is slowly but steadily settling down to the level at which a demand for export to Great Britain may be calculated upon, in fact, 300,000 boxes, 19 lbs. each, were shipped this week, and on a basis of 2½¢ at the factories, we may look for a good general demand. Prices at the factories this week have ranged from 20½¢ to 21¢ a lb.

## MONTREAL HOG MARKET

Montreal, Saturday, May 27.—The market here for live hogs was weaker again this week, and recorded a further decline of 15¢ a cwt. At the lower level there was a good demand and the offerings were quickly cleared. There was a good demand for dressed hogs at \$9.50 to \$9.75 a cwt. for fresh killed abattoir stock.

London, Ont., May 27.—Eight hundred and fifty boxes offered; 26 boxes sold at 10½¢, 155 at 10½¢.

St. Catharines, May 27.—Five hundred and fifty packages of butter, boarded, sold at 20½¢, 200 boxes of cheese sold at 10½¢.

Ottawa, May 26.—178 white and 227 colored cheese boarded. All sold at 10½¢.

Cornwall, May 26.—319 white and 731 colored offered. All sold at 10½¢.

Troquois, May 26.—1,010 colored cheese sold at 10½¢.
