On Thanksgiving Day, 17th November, the Corps took part in the sham battle, with the troops of the Toronto and Hamilton garrisons, being the only Cadet Corps present. They were attached to the defenders, and in the course of the day it fell to their lot to hold in check an advance of two battalions of the attacking force, while the defenders completed a movement which was all important to them. The Cadet Corps were, of course, overwhelmed by the numbers which they opposed, and, theoretically, all slain or captured, but they did their part. Mr. Nash was in charge of the signallers of the advancing force, and had the St. Alban's signallers in his party. The Corps were very much in evidence, and attracted a good deal of notice. We append two newspaper cuttings which illustrate this:

"A word of praise is due the St. Alban's Cadets. The little fellows, to the number of 40 or 50, marched manfully along in the rear of the defending force, and were right on the firing line at the Humber. They did good service there, holding in check, for a time, the advance of the Hamilton Highlanders. "They did well for kids," said an officer of the defending force."

"The St. Alban's Cadet Corps proved a revelation to many. The young chaps moved with a precision, and showed evidence of discipline, that might well cause their elders to sit up and think. Capt. Matthews has them well in hand. Still, an observer might come to the conclusion that Sergt. John White, of Stanley Barracks, has been busy about St. Alban's School. If this is so, Sergt. White has my sincere congratulations."
