TITLE TO LAND.

Can a widow, having a child of 6 or 7 years old, give me a clear title to a farm if I should buy it off her?

Ans.-We assume that the farm belonged to her husband, although the fact is not stated, but we are not informed as to whether he left a will or died intestate. But, in either case, and assuming further that the husband's title was good and unencumbered, a proper and sufficient conveyance by the widow (with possibly the concurrence of the Official Guardian of Infants, of Ontario), could be arranged for by a solicitor, and the purchaser would thereby acquire a clear title.
