Parisian Dress Expert Believes Women Should Study Own Requirements

This says Paul Poirer, the fashion authority of Paris in an article entitled "Individuality in Dress." He continues:

But that is the way fashion sways some women to-day. That is why I am almost inclined to say that the only well-dressed woman are those who dare and create original ideas, not those who servilely follow fashion."
"In order not to appear entirely out of harmony with her surroundings and the place where she lives, a woman is obliged to follow fashions to a certain extent. But let that be within certain bounds. What does it matter if tight skirts be the fashion if your figure demands a wide one? Is it not more important to dress so as to bring out your good points rather than to reveal the bad? Can any idea of being fashionable make up for the fact of being ridiculous?"
