SHOCKED AND HAUNTED

BY BELGIUMS' FLIGHT Father of Family Decried That Walls of Hungry Children Meant It Was Time for Him to Act.

Montreal, April 24.—One of the contributions of money which has gone forth for the purchase of food for the starving Belgian children was accompanied by a letter of unusual interest. This subscriber, who signs himself "I never saw a little child really starving, yet the call to help 'didn't seem to mean me.'"

"Starving children! The words shocked and haunted me, I couldn't get away from them. I began to wonder if I really meant to stop my ears to such a cry. I never saw a little child really starving. My own children have always had plenty, with extras thrown in. How would I feel if I saw them starting to starve? I heard their mother say they were starving? A shivering feeling came over me as I seemed to see a Belgian mother holding her baby in her trembling arms, close to her weaned breast, and to hear her crying out in agony and despair to me, 'In the name of God, the Father, save my baby. All around were yearling mothers and children being helped by somebody else; but this mother seemed to be waiting for me, and calling to me, to save her baby. How can I do otherwise than leap up from the comparative bounty of my own comfortable home, and make haste to send life and health to at least one starving baby, and put it in my power to help her mouth a cry of joy in place of her cry of despair?'

In order to give the Belgians the minimum of food required to keep them from starving, but at least strong enough to resist disease, an extra \$2,000,000 per month is required over and above the subscriptions which have been coming forward to date. That can only be obtained if everyone whom the appeal of the Belgian Relief Commission reaches realizes that the appeal means him or her. Subscriptions, large or small, will be gratefully acknowledged by the Central Belgian Relief Committee, 59 St. Peter Street, Montreal, or if more convenient they may be sent to any local committee in connection with the Belgian Relief Fund.

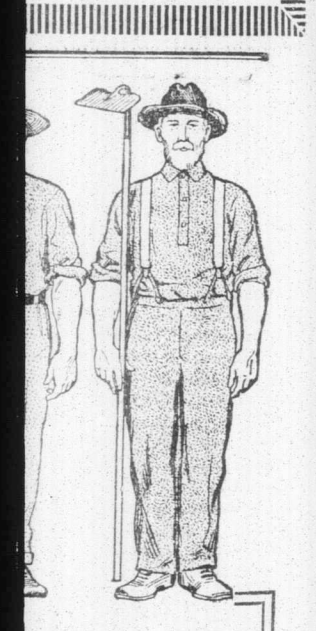
