had run aground on the St. Pierre Bank in  
a fog the previous evening. The Rock-  
cliffe is being repaired at North Sydney.NOTICE - L. C. Archibald will com-

ries on Monday, June 3rd, and at Black  
River Mills, June 10th. A circular re-  
garding the prices to be paid for milk will  
be distributed among the patrons of the  
several factories it possible before the  
opening.L. C. ARCHIBALD, of this Town, has  
made arrangements to operate the cheese  
factory at Cape George owned and oper-  
ated last season by John McDonald, and  
will open it for business Monday, June 3rd.  
The price for milk is the same as at his  
other factories in the County. A meeting  
will be held at the factory on an early date,  
due notice of which will be given.MR. R. F. PHALEN, who has been con-  
fined to his residence for some weeks past  
with a broken leg, is fast regaining his  
wondered health and vigor. With the aid of  
crutches Mr. Phalen was able to walk  
down town on Thursday last. Robert's

see him about again shortly completely re-

in good running order and turning out  
excellent work. The very best steel cards  
are in use, and all work is overseen by  
Mr. Carr, of Pictou Co., a very practical  
man of long experience. The building  
has been constructed with a view to facili-  
tate and economize labor, and is iron cov-  
ered and fire proof. The owners are C. B. Whidden, H. K. Brise,  
K. Sweet, and H. H. McCurdy.ELECTION - A telegram to the Sheriff  
on Thursday afternoon last fixed the date  
of the election for the vacant seat in the  
House of Assembly for this County for  
Thursday June 12. As already stated,  
Hon. A. Macpherson is the Liberal  
nominee. The Conservative convention  
to nominate meets in town to-day. It is,  
we understand, a foregone conclusion that  
their choice will be Dr. D. M. Fraser, of  
Halifax, who is a native of this county.  
Next Thursday is nomination day.ROBBERY - The house of Ben. Fougere,  
of Frankville, this County, was entered on  
Sunday while the owner was at Church,  
and \$62 in cash and some promissory notes  
were stolen. On Monday morning Alex.  
Benoit and Toussant Gotro, two young men  
belonging to Linwood, were arrested as the  
culprits. Sixty dollars of the money was  
recovered from them. They were brought  
to Antigonish same day, and are now in  
jail waiting an investigation, which will  
probably be held to-day.ACCIDENTAL DEATH - Monday morning  
Mr. Allan McDonald, merchant, of Antigonish,  
received a telegram announcing the  
accidental death of his son by an electric  
shock, of Patrick Beaton at Amesbury,  
Mass. No particulars were given. It is  
supposed that he was on a pole at the  
time he received the shock working at  
the wires. He was the youngest son of  
Peter Beaton, of Meek's Head, Antigonish,  
and was but nineteen years of age.  
He left home only six weeks ago, and  
has since been engaged as a lineman.  
The remains are expected home to-day.  
Much sympathy is felt for the bereaved  
family.ST. PETER'S CANAL - Work on the St.  
Peter's canal is now being carried on under  
the supervision of Mr. McCarthy, resident  
engineer, with Contractor O'Donoghue as  
foreman. Mr. O'Donoghue was obliged tothrow up the contract for replacing the  
canal owing to the fact that the plans speci-  
fied in the contract for the replacing of the  
locks has proven impracticable, as the  
water percolated through the filling and  
while forming the embankment as fast as  
it could be pumped out, and was found  
impossible to pump the canal out, or at  
least that part of it necessary to permit of  
the work on the locks. An attempt is now  
being made to cut into the embankments  
sufficiently far to reach the solid earth and  
build dams in the apertures thus formed.  
To remove the earth, stone and wood  
work in the embankments for this purpose  
necessitates the employment of divers and  
the work is necessarily slow. - N. S. Herald.THE SUPREME COURT is in session this
