

TO THE ELECTORS OF NORTH COLCHESTER

On the 22nd of this month, you will have an opportunity of deciding, by the polling of your votes, what is the deepest importance to any elector in the north side of Colchester—the building, or not, of the Northern Railroad from Oxford to New Glasgow, and every elector should see that he votes his vote to secure that end. This railroad is of the greatest importance to us all—to the farmer, as it will give him a market for his best, pack butter, potatoes, eggs, hay, and oats, every day in the year—Sundays excepted—at his own door, and saving him two hours' time, the spring Bill in the west, and the fall in the east; both good markets. To the mechanics: building is constantly going on, requiring your services, and to the laborer, being in its vicinity, a large amount of work. To the merchant, it will have a traffic of twenty miles on the road, and will enable you to supply your customers with what they require, at much cheaper rates; or, if not, they will have easy access of other stores. The question now for you to decide, is to whom we are to look for the completion of this work.

Two parties are before you, asking you to sustain them at the polls—the Liberal-Conservative party, with the Hon. A. W. McLELLAN as their representative, from whom we have a pledge that, if elected, he will endeavor to secure the opening of Parliament, will take the lead from the present Company, who have raised such a large amount of money, and completed next season as part of their programme. The other, the Grit party, with S. D. McLELLAN as their representative, and the leader of whom will be Mr. Blake, who has always been opposed to the building of railroads in Nova Scotia, and the guarantee of any other improvements to your Province.

Now, it is the duty of every elector to calmly consider from which of the two parties you are to gain the object in view, and vote for that party. If you make a wise choice, you will vote for the Liberal-Conservative party, from whom you have the pledge, that if returned, they will do what you want, and not the party opposed to the building of railroads, as depend upon it should Mr. Blake's party be returned, you will never see a road to the north. It will be much better for the County, through which the road is to be built, that it should be a Government work, and from part of the late colonial; this will ensure the building of it at all times at low rates of freight. The Grits tell you that the Liberal-Conservative party, by their Protection policy, are taking the County by taxation. Let me ask you, in what way is it that the Liberal-Conservative party are daily being taxed? Can you not today get a barrel of flour for \$2.50 to \$3.00, a pound of tea for 5 cents that used to cost 10 cents, a yard of cloth for 5 cents that used to cost 10 cents, and so on? If you cannot get these things, it is not the fault of the Liberal-Conservative party, but of the Protection policy, which is not to be faulted. Is not Protection keeping up your cotton manufactures, sugar, and other goods, and making us independent of other countries? All the Grit policy of free trade, all these works would have to close down.

They also tell you the Americans are closing their ports against us, we will have no trade with the States. What in mercy is there in the County that will allow him to come and pull down his line, fence, come and dig his potatoes, and carry them off for sale without defending his rights? Is it the same way, the Americans—our neighbors—are getting just what we give them within the three-mile limit of our shore, and the Government defend them and won't allow our neighbors to get in there without an equivalent, they adopt a retaliatory policy. It's a poor trick that won't defend his own shingle, and any Government that would not do so, would be no better than a chattering hen!

Is there a man in the north side of Colchester but who believes that the rebel Riel, who was the cause of so much of our blood being shed and money spent, did not justly deserve the same? We own the land within the three-mile limit of our shore, and the Government defend them and won't allow our neighbors to get in there without an equivalent, they adopt a retaliatory policy. It's a poor trick that won't defend his own shingle, and any Government that would not do so, would be no better than a chattering hen!

This S. D. McLELLAN, the representative of the Grit party, of which Mr. Blake is the leader, is asking you to vote for him—a party opposed to the building of your railroad, or any other in Nova Scotia, and would, by introducing a Free Trade policy, ruin your home industries, and shut your factories and mills, and ruin yours, and shut your neighbors out, and would allow your neighbors—the Americans—to fish in your waters without any equivalent; and, for the sole purpose of gaining power, have dragged themselves with Rielites, that will keep your country in constant turmoil.
