

The increases shown by these figures are: assessment, \$1,300; dogs, 1; cattle, 21; horses, 18; population, 38. This is a much better showing than last year, when the deaths con-siderably more than doubled the number of births, but still it is far from encouraging, as it is apparent from the record of all the rolls that, left entirely to itself, the population of Athens would in time completely disappear, Just think of it!
