

PREMIERS SEE THE NAVY

FLEET TO COLONIAL VISITORS.

Destroyers and Submarines Make Mimic Attack On the Leviathan-Dreadnought Makes a Deep Impression-Her Record Unrivalled-10,000 Mile Voyage, and Fierce Tests-Is Complete Success.

The Colonial Premiers were recently taken to Portsmouth as guests of the Admiralty, to get a glimpse of the Empire's navy. Ten battleships, including the Dreadnought, a score of cruisers and 37 torpedo boat destroyers, all belonging to the Home Fleet, assembled in these waters, were reviewed by the visiting statesmen, who were especially interested in the newest battleship. In describing the Dreadnought, the officials program of the day's proceedings says:

"She has satisfied her creators and fulfilled all anticipations. When 30 per cent. of her guns were first fired together, with a total energy of 345,792 foot tons, some cups and sancers were broken. All else withstood the immediate concussion, and the difficult problem of preventing the blast of one gun from interfering with that of another was found to have been satisfactorily solved. She has completed a voyage of 10,000 miles and without using all her boiler power, maintained a speed of over seventeen knots for 3,400 miles and could have done another thousand at the same speed."

A mimic attack was also prepared for the entertainment of the visitors.
On a signal being made twelve destroyers in three divisions dashed into



the harbor at high speed, the boats being in one long single line with but two hundred feet separating each pair of boats as they passed the Dread-

nought.

Keeping a magnificent station, every alternate destroyer discharged a tor-pedo into the Dreadnought's net. The contrast between each of these little vessels, snake-like in their move-ments, and the huge mass of the Dreadnought was most striking, and Dreadnought was most striking, and equally significant was the accuracy with which each of the missiles found its mark. The flotilla was followed by a group of submarines, some in diving trim. The difference in various types was very apparent. The earliest boats were only sixfy-three feet long, with a displacement of 100 tons, whereas the latest boats are 135 feet long and have a displacement of more than 300 tons. These boats, driven by gasolene engines, have a speed, on the surface, of about twelve knots, and when submerged, using their electric motors, move through the water at a rate of about nine knots. The exhibition was simple, pretty, and impressive. The nerve, good judgment and skill shown by those in charge was highly appreciated by the spectators.

More African Wonders.

More of Africa's hidden wonders are explained to the outside world by Mr. H. Vischer, one of the Protectorate residents in Bornu, who has just journeyed across the Sahara desert from Tripoli to Lake Chad.

In the mountains of Gharian, he told a Reuter's correspondent, he found people living in subterranean dwellings. Through entranees 10 yards long and one yard broad he came upon a square courtyard, which was in reality a great hole open to the sky. Upon all this the rooms were yery dark and there were no windows, sky. Upon all this the rooms and stables converged. The rooms were very dark and there were no windows, but the most absolute cleanliness prevailed. Round the courtyard was a wall protecting the dwelling underneath.

Describing part of his journey across the waterless desert Mr. Vischer says:
"We had a five days' march across the desert without water. At the

we had a nive days march across the desert without water. At the commencement of the desert all cars-vans waited for one another, until our vans waited for one another, until our combined party numbered over 500 camels. No carevan dares to go through the desert alone. Everywhere the ground is covered with windpolished stones, which are gradually themselves becoming sand. Everywhere is an endless horizon. Often apparently we see lakes and palm groves, but on all sides are nothing but stones, stones, until the sun disappears and the sky becomes filled with colors which would have given joy to a Titian or a Turner. All our marching is done at night."

"Homeless Persons."

"Homeless Persons."

One in every two thousand people in London is homeless. That is the result of a census carried out by the County Council concerning "homeless persons." By homeless is meant not the outeasts who wander about the streets, but those who spend the night in common lodging-houses, and shelters, and other institutions, including casual wards. Besides these homeless of the poorest classes there are vargrants who seek no temporary home, or are unable to pay for it. They wander about the streets all night, and sleep on park benches during the day. The supply of free food at shelters assists these outcasts to remain in the streets. The Public Health Committee of the County Council consider that they are sometimes a danger to the community as they may spread disease, and are always a nuisance. It is proposed to obtain powers to compel these wanderers to use the casual ward, where they will be fed and washed.

Boise, July 1.-At the trial of Wiliam Haywood on Saturday, Dominick Flynn, a merchant of Mullen, Idaho, declared that Harry Orchard

Idaho, declared that Harry Orchard on April 29, 1899, the day of the explosion at the Bunker Hill and Sulivan mill, played poker in his place from noon until 4 p.m.

Cross-examined by Senator Borah, Flynn declared he had never been a member of any labor organization. He had known Orchard a year and a half and the man often played poker at his place. One of the men who played with Orchard was Patrick McHale.

McHale, who is a bartender in Mullen, followed Flynn on the stand. He said he played poker with Orchard in Flynn's cigar store April 29, 1899, and had never seen the man since.

On cross-examination McHale admitted that he had gambled every time he got a chance.

Other operatives who were connected with unions in Colorado were: Joseph F. Gaddon, Charles H. Rymer, George W. Riddell, P. B. Bailey, Cummings Lutlow and Conibear. Friedman declared he handled most of the daily reports from these men for a year and a half.

Boise, Idaho, July 2.—The defence in the trial of William D. Haywood began the second week of direct examination of its witnesses, yesterday, when Morris Friedman, the young man who was at one time the stenographer in the Denver office of the Pinkerton Detective Agency, was recalled to the stand. He is looked upon by the defence as one of the chief witnesses to prove a conspiracy on the part of the Mine Owners' Association and others to exterminate the Western Federation of Miners.

The defence expects to conclude the direct testimony this week.
