SIR HECTOR ACDONALD. Broad Arrow, Official Military Organ of

Consequently they subscribed a certain sum of money, and deputed certain persons to proceed to Ceylon for purposes of investigation. On their return they reported that Sir Hector Macdonald was innocent of the charge made against him. The result of the investigation was sent to the chief London papers, but only one inserted the statement. As, however, the original accusation was widely spread, it is only just that the exposure of the falsehood of that accusation should be given equal publicity."

Novel Trap for Thieves.

For some time the postoffice au thorities in France have been much annoyed by an organized band of thieves who stole mail day after day out of the letter boxes, but now they have discovered a contrivance which, they are confident, will put a top to such thefts in future. It con-sists of a clockwork arrangement which is fastened to each letter box and is so connected with the main postoffice that the moment any one attempts to tamper with the mail a bell rings and notifies detectives who are on the outlook for the culprits

are on the outlook for the culprits day and night.

When a letter is thrown into a box or when a postman extracts the letters the bell also rings, but the sound is different from that which is made when a thief is at work, and therefore there is no danger that the detectives will ever be led off on a wild grosse chase. a wild goose chase.

The clamor in Japan against Admiral Kamimura because he failed to catch the Russian fleet from Vladi-vostock recalls an incident, fortu-nately rare, in the British navy. Admiral Byng withdrew before a superi-or French fleet in 1756 and lost Minorca. The British people were stung to madness by the exultations of the French, and the Admiral was court-martialled. Notwithstanding the generous statement of the great Richelieu that if the British fleet had not retired it would have been completely overwhelmed, Admiral Byng was condemned and was shot on March 14, 1757. One of those who exerted himself on behalf of the unfortunate Admiral was Voltaire, and in this connection he wrote the memorable lines: "In this country it is good to put an Admiral to death now and then in order to encourage the oth-

Costly for the Farmers.

Many times it happens that the farmers in the stormy season cannot get to the railroads, and therefore the produce which he would like to market and for which the market is clamoring is cut off by bad roads.
Could the farmer at all seasons draw his produce to the nearest shipping point he would use his own ime to better advantage because he would do this drawing in dull sea-sons, and the rolling stock of the railroads would be far more effectual, because a steady supply of freigh would in a measure do away with the congestion of traffic which hap-pens from time to time and which is a source of great loss to all concern-

Cheap Living in Denmark. In Denmark \$4 a week is wages for a laboring man. He live comfortably upon that wage and bring up a large family of children. Four dollars a week to the Danish laborer means much more than \$1.50 a day to the Canadian laborer bethe cost of living is compara-little. Skilled workmen are paid \$1 to \$1.25 a day, which affords them ample means. Provisions are cheap, and at the best hotels rooms may be had by transients for 60 cents a day, our money.

Zine Ceilings.

According to the Metal Industry stamped sheet zinc is rapidly coming stamped sheet zine is rapidly coming into use for metal ceilings in places where steel has heretofore been used. In Germany the material is even copper plated and given beautiful finishes. Those who have had experience with rusting of steel will readily appreciate the advantage of using zinc.

Her Proper Sphere. The real results of this modern woman's movement are seen, I believe, says Dr. Lyman Abbott in the World's Work, in better wages to self supporting women; in enlarged opportunities for productible industry; in consequent industrial independence for unmarried women; in a resultant release from the odious compulsion which drove women into marriage as the only means of livelihood open to them; in an end to that kind of marital subordination which grew out of the fact that an uneducated woman is inferior to an educated man; in an intellectual companionship in the married life based on a common understanding of all life move ments and a common interest in them all; in the ability of the mother to keep the intellectual respect of her boy after he has gone out of the home to college or to business and to be his trusted counselor and his inspirer; in woman's broader horizon, larger life and more richly endowed character; in the ampler service she can render to society, to her country and to the world, and in her better equipment for the finest and highest service of all, that which is inherent in motherhood.

"It is a woman's destiny," Balzac makes one of his characters say, "to create not things, but men. Our creations are our children; our children are our pictures, our books and studies."

of life, the mother creates life.


