ED. WHALEN OF WINDSOR RECEIVES SEVERE INJURIES

He Was Standing On The Rear Of A Passenger Coach
When He Fell Off—His Back Probably Broken
—Taken To Windsor

A most lamentable accident occurred last evening about 9 o'clock, at the Grand Trunk Diamond, just a short distance from this city, whereby Edward Whalen, of Windsor, is injured, probably, for life.

Whalen is a stationary engineer, and was returning home to Windsor on the express which passes through here about nine o'clock. Just after leaving Chatham, Whalen, who was riding in one of the rear coaches, thought that he would go to the rear platform of the train and get a little fresh air.

While walking on the platform he accidentally stepped off the rear of the train and fell to the ground. The train was going at a good rate of speed at the time, and the unfortunate man was given a severe shaking up, besides having his back badly injured.

A short time after the train had

passed the diamond, the signal man heard someone calling for help, and he hurried to the place from whence the cries came. He found Whalen lying between the tracks where he had fallen, helpless.

At a quarter after nine o'clock, Dr. J. L. Bray was summoned, and when he arrived he found the man in a serious condition. He was evidently suffering great pain. It was dark and the doctor found a minute examination impossible. He however did all he could to relieve the man's sufferings, and had him carried back to the station. The injured man said that he was employed by Mr. Marx, of Windsor.

Whalen was placed on a stretcher, and as he wished to go on to Windsor, a Windsor express, which was late, and arrived here about ten o'clock, was stopped and the man was placed in the baggage car and proceeded to Windsor.

It was impossible to define his injuries, both his legs were paralyzed, and his back was severely injured—probably broken.

GUARDS KILL SEVENTEEN

Havana, Aug. 28.—Col. Vale of the Rural Guards reported to the Government by telegraph last night that he had defeated an insurgent force under Gen. Guzman, near Cienfuegos, killing 17 of the insurgents.

The loss to the Rural Guards was one man and four horses.

An All-Night Fight.

A party of insurgents, commanded by Col. Sanchez, entered the Town of Befucal, Province of Havana, at 11 o'clock Sunday night, fortified themselves and fought all night against an attacking force of Government recruits and rural guards without any other result than three of the defenders of the place and one rural guard being killed.

Instructions as to Amnesty.

Gen. Montalvo, acting secretary of the Interior, has issued an order, under the direction of President Palma, instructing the Government officials in the Provinces of Pinar del Rio, Havana, Matanzas and Santa Clara, to allow all insurgents who repent of their error to go free to their homes, excepting those who are prisoners in the hands of the Government forces and captured commanders of insurgent bands, who will be detained until the Government determines whether they are to be allowed their freedom or are to be tried by the courts. All chiefs of insurgent bands who surrender themselves to the Government forces or who surrender with their followers and their arms will also be allowed to return to their families.

Miss Palma a Field Nurse.

The name of President Palma's daughter appears on the list of women who have offered themselves to serve as nurses during the suppression of the insurrection.

There are thirty Americans among the recruits who have joined Major Clews' new rapid fire gun battalion. Rural guards yesterday arrested several prominent Liberals, including two editors of Manzanillo, Province of Santiago, who are charged with conspiracy. It is said they were about to organize an insurgent band in the Province of Santiago.

Barcelome Masro, a noted Cuban leader, made a speech at a meeting of veterans at Manzanillo Sunday, which decided to send a committee to attend a veterans' meeting which is to be held shortly in Havana.

The chief of the secret service has formally charged Senator Moron Delgado with being one of the initiators of the insurrection and with being at present one of its chief supporters. The chief claims that Delgado led the late Quintin Bandera to revolt. Delgado is the only colored Senator.

Foreman Falls to Death.

London, Aug. 28.—Bridge Foreman Charles Armstrong made a mistake yesterday afternoon while on top of some piles at the Cove bridge and fell 23 feet, sustaining fatal injuries, dying in an hour. He belonged to Stratford, where a widow and two children survive him.

Earl Grey In an Accident.

Winnipeg, Aug. 28.—The vice-regal party left yesterday morning for Portage, where they received a hearty welcome.

Earl Grey is suffering from a slight accident which happened in Winnipeg. While standing near an electric light bulb on Sunday night, it exploded, and a portion of the glass entered his right eye. Medical aid was summoned and the glass extracted. It is hoped that no serious effects will result.

PASSED AWAY

A respected colored resident of Chatham township passed away last night in the death of Jordan McLachlan, at his home on Lot 1, concession 6. The deceased was 75 years of age and was one of the pioneer residents, having made a success of farming, in which he was engaged the major portion of his life. He leaves a son and a daughter to mourn his loss.

The funeral arrangements have not yet been completed.

BEST MAN STOLE WIFE

Paris, Aug. 27.—Henri Fabre, a retail grocer at Grenoble, wooed his prospective mother-in-law, widow of a wealthy tradesman, at the first step toward winning her daughter for his wife. He succeeded beyond his bargaining, for he won, too, the love of the mother, who, scorned, told the bride. The latter, chagrined, consoled herself by eloping with the best man.

For a week the grocer hunted the couple in vain. Then he closed his shop, shut himself up in his lodgings and committed suicide.

CIGARETTES CURE

Cleveland, Aug. 28.—Dr. Martin Friedrich, health officer of Cleveland, advises women of the smart set to smoke cigarettes if they would preserve their complexions and escape heart disease. Tea, of which society women are so fond, causes heart disease, he says, because it stimulates the heart without feeding it. No-tine is required to counteract the beverage.

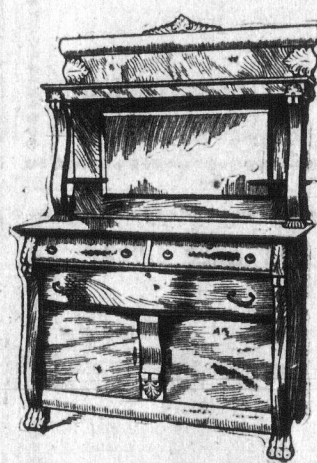
