**BIG EXPLOSION OF DYNAMITE.**

Quebec, Dec. 1.—Over 50 pounds of dynamite in a shed at St. Romauld exploded Wednesday afternoon, the shock hurled two men through the air, injuring them only slightly, however, and causing nearly every building along the south shore down as far as St. Joseph de Levis and as far west as St. Nicholas to quiver and break windows in many. St. Romauld Church especially was damaged, window panes and lamps being smashed. The noise was heard in Quebec.

The explosion badly wrecked some of the buildings nearby.

**70 SHIPS LOST.**

Unprecedented Destruction of Big Lake Craft in Three Recent Storms—149 Men Perish.

Detroit, Dec. 2.—The Journal yesterday says 149 lives have been sacrificed, over 70 ships wrecked, and a loss of nearly \$7,000,000 has been sustained in the three big storms on the great lakes this season. That this is the most disastrous season in the history of shipping on the lakes is beyond doubt.

Lacked Courage and Dye.

Duluth, Minn., Dec. 2.—Three men lost their lives in the wreck of the scow George Herbert at Two Islands. They were Ole Miller, George Olsen, and Ole Nelson, all of Duluth. When the scow went on the rocks, Wm. Hicks and Charles Johnson saved themselves by jumping ashore. The other three lacked courage, and as the scow broke, shouted their last good-bye and disappeared.

Grain Steamer Ashore.

Marquette, Mich., Dec. 2.—The steel steamer Western Star, bound for Port William to load grain, Thursday went ashore, two miles east of Fourteen-Mile Point, near Ontonagon, after all hearings had been lost in a struggle for hours in a terrific sea. The crew is reported safe.

Owen Probably Wrecked.

Ashland, Wis., Dec. 2.—The steamer Ira H. Owen is probably among the lost vessels on Lake Superior, with its crew of nineteen men. The steamer Sir Wm. Siemens arrived yesterday at Ashland and reported seeing wreckage from the Owen.

Four Days Without Food.

Port Arthur, Dec. 2.—Capt. McIntyre and the remainder of the crew of the Monksheaven were brought to shore last evening, and they tell of hardships such as few sailors ever experience. For 96 hours the men were without food, and with starvation staring them in the face they boarded the sinking steamer and procured food and fuel. The Monksheaven has a big hole in her bottom.

**GOES DOWN WITH FOUR.**

New Steel Barge Founders Near Boston in Heavy Sea.

Boston, Dec. 2.—The foundering of the new steel barge Delawanna, and the loss of four persons on board, was reported here yesterday by the tug Scranton, which had been towing the Delawanna from New York. The barge went down in a heavy sea at 8.30 o'clock Thursday night, about eight miles from Minot's Light.

Those lost were: Capt. John B. Munsey, Mrs. Munsey, his wife; engineer of the barge and the cook of the barge.

**CZAR BREATHES EASIER.**

Danger of Immediate General Strike Over—Premier Witte Apparently Saves the Situation.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 2, 2.50 a.m.—The guards arrested at Tsarskoe Selo Thursday night and Friday morning numbered 250, including 20 officers. All kinds of rumors are current, including the assertion that one of the Grand Dukes is involved in a conspiracy against the Emperor.

Late yesterday afternoon the outlook for a temporary improvement in the situation which would give the Government an opportunity to catch its breath was brighter. The danger of an immediate general strike was considered to be practically averted as the result of three-cornered negotiations between Premier Witte, the employers and the workmen, by which it was decided that both the Government and private establishments which are now closed shall be reopened.

It is announced that Father Gapen has fled to Finland.

A state of minor siege has been declared in Trans-Caspia and Saratopol. Developments that during the mutiny at Sebastopol the sailors of the volunteer fleet at Odessa and the engineers of the South-Western Railway refused to transport troops and artillery to Sebastopol.

The Emperor presided yesterday at a meeting of the council of Ministers. Much comment has been caused by the Emperor's summons to Count Pahlen, a member of the council of the Empire, and one of the oldest and most trusted servants of the house of Romanoff, who participated in the secession, presumably to voice his Majesty's views.

**CRUEL RUSE PRISONERS.**

Tokio, Dec. 2.—Gen. Baron Kuroki, who commanded the Japanese right army in Manchuria, will leave Port Dalny to-day for Japan. The balance in favor of Japan for prisoners' expenses is estimated at \$25,000,000. It is believed that this sum will be devoted to the development of the interests of Manchuria.

**ENFORCING THE REGULATIONS.**

Northern Ontario Settlers Must Now Obey Much Broken Law.

Toronto, Dec. 2.—A story from Northern Ontario is to the effect that the Ontario Government is notifying many families who have not been complying with the regulations to get out.

Among the conditions a settler must observe are that he must erect a house and barn, must occupy the premises and clear a certain number of acres every year. After three years faithful observance he is given a patent to 160 acres, for which he pays 50 cents per acre. It is said the settlers have not lived up to their obligations, that the lands have been held for speculation, and that settlement has been retarded.

**Gunner Berry Responsible.**

Quebec, Dec. 2.—Gunner Richard Kidd, alias "Zed," who was shot by Gunner John Berry at the Citadel on Sunday last, and died from the effect of the wound he received, will be buried with military honors to-day. The jury brought in a verdict that Gunner John Berry was criminally responsible for the death of Richard Kidd.

**McCall Not to Retire.**

New York, Dec. 2.—John C. McCall, secretary of the New York Life Insurance Co., and son of John A. McCall, the president, denied yesterday the report that he and his father were to retire from their offices in the company in January.
