performed by the Association not only in remembrance of their fallen brethren but also to those who had been fortunate to return and to those who had missed their loved ones who will not return.

The Boys in France
Brigadier-General James Kirkcaldy gave an interesting address on "The Boys in France." The General very ably asserted his admiration of the Canadians in France. "Their spirit was endurance and self-sacrifice." He spoke of the great brotherly love of all comrades in the stress of battle and quoted his own Battalion, the Seventy-eighth Grenadiers, as taking an Orange Lodge with them right to the firing line, headed by what he considered the strongest officer in the unit, the Quartermaster. "A man who was ever on duty and who was always responsible for the providing of food under all conditions to his men. He carried out his duty faithfully and achieved as much for the men under his command, as for the members of the lodge with him. There were none better. They were of fighting material and they fought their best. He could only quote those immortal words of Colonel McCrea. 'Hold High the Torch' and trust that all would seek to show the real brotherly love here as the boys had found it in France."

Let Us Forget
General Kirkcaldy stated that he noticed the men on the streets with the buttons on the lapels of their coats, and they looked to be better men for their experiences in France. Many of the returned men did not find the real fellowship upon returning home he had become accustomed to in France, owing to business prestige. "Let us forget," the speaker gave instances of meeting a returned by on the street corner who told him of receiving a pension of \$2.50 per month and another boy with a mangled arm who only received seven dollars. This was not true fellowship, for if they were entitled to any pension, such was an insult. "Let us remember," said the General, "those who died and also those who have returned to us but who would have gladly died had it been necessary."

Major Charles Whillier in his address stated that he had come in touch with a very large number of men of Brandon district during his service in France, England and Canada. It would be a surprise to many, said the speaker, when he stated that when the call for "A" class men was made, there were only five out of the city of Brandon. A city which at the outbreak of the war had a possible allotment of 2,000 men of military age. When "B" class was called up of course there were many more, but many of these boys had volunteered previously and some even had received a military discharge. He quoted some incidents in France and the boys whose names were on the tablet were just as good as the best. The men of Ulster were amongst the first to hold back the enemy and they proved their metal in checking the Hun's onward rush.

Brotherly Fellowship
A solo "Our Little Task," by Rev. C. G. Stone was much enjoyed by those present.
The Rev. M. L. Orchard in the closing address spoke strongly for a great Forward Movement of Brotherly Fellowship. "In union and co-operation is strength," said the speaker. If this prevailed there would be no need of anyone getting just a \$2.50 pension if he was entitled to one at all. "He gave an instance of a young man saying what a great thing it was to go over and fight for his country, but who was answered by his pal, 'It is a greater thing to come home and help to keep the land fit and worthy to return to.'"

The program was concluded by the singing of the National Anthem, after which the members of the Ladies' Orange Benevolent served refreshments.

WAR BRIDES IN THE U.S.

New York, N.Y., Dec. 26.—New York leads all states in the number of war brides brought back by American soldiers, according to a report by the Y.W.C.A. Out of 2,239, this state received 347, representing 16 nations. Among New York's consignments were 222 French women, four Belgians, four from Luxembourg, 64 English, 21 Irish, 13 Scotch, six Welsh, two Swiss, three Italian, two Spanish and one each from Germany, Portugal, Roumania, Poland and Holland.

"Of the brides, 893 did not speak English at all, 435 spoke it only slightly and 960 fluently. Approximately half have trades or professions and have been self-supporting."

The grand total included 1,505 French brides, 426 English, 47 Irish, 49 Belgian and 46 Scotch.

CRESCOGRAPH BARES TO VISION PLANT GROWTH

Remarkable Demonstration Is Given by Sir Jagadis Chandra Bose in London

HUGE MAGNIFYING POWER

Instrument Makes Movement of Snail Faster Than Velocity of 15-inch Shell

London, Dec. 16 (by mail).—Demonstration of an instrument to show plants actually growing was made by Sir Jagadis Chandra Bose in the India Office, at a meeting over which A. J. Balfour presided. The instrument is a kind of super-microscope, and at the conclusion of the meeting, Mr. Balfour paid a warm tribute to the work of the lecturer, who, he said, had made discoveries of world-wide interest. Sir Jagadis holds that the most intense activities of life often are imperceptible; for instance, within the unruffled exterior of the body of an ordinary plant incessant throbbings associated with its growth are in progress. Extreme difficulty in investigating these in the past has been due to the extraordinary slowness of growth, the average rate for plants being about 1,100th part of an inch per second.

The observation of this slow growth is made easy by this new magnetic crescograph, an instrument Sir Jagadis invented especially for this purpose and which in operation is for this purpose equivalent to magnifying the highest powers of the microscope 100,000 times. To illustrate this tremendous magnification he mentioned that the movements of a snail under the crescograph would appear to be so rapid that it would be difficult to find a parallel even in modern gunnery.

A fifteen inch queen on the super-dreadnought Queen Elizabeth threw a shell with a muzzle velocity of about 8,500,000 feet an hour; the crescographic snail would appear to move at 200,000,000 feet an hour, or twenty times faster than a cannon shot. For a closer parallel he turned to cosmic movements. A point on the equator whirled around at a rate of more than 1,000 miles an hour, but the crescographic snail might well look down upon the sluggish earth, for by the time it had made one revolution the snail would have made forty.

The crescograph is an instrument quite simple in appearance. A single magnetic lever rotates a delicately poised needle and a spot light reflected from the mirror which is attached to the needle, travels back and forth upon a screen as the mirror swings, giving a magnification of 1,000,000 times, which can be increased to 100,000,000 times. Material contact, which in the past has put a limit to magnification higher than 10,000 times, has been eliminated.

With the aid of this device the life activity of a plant can be rendered subservient to the will of the experimenter; depressing chemicals can be applied until its life is brought to a state of arrest; the timely application of stimulants revives the dying plants and increases its life activity to many times the normal.

MODERATE MEN APPROVE LLOYD GEORGE PLAN

London, Dec. 30.—Christmas recess has brought plenty of hard thinking to bear upon the Irish riddle. Surface impressions all confirm Lloyd George's diagnosis that no Irish section would wholeheartedly applaud his new home rule plan. No previous scheme, certainly not Gladstone's, nor Asquith's, had anything like so favorable English and Scottish press comment, but Ulster speaking through Lynn, proprietor of the Northern Whig, Belfast, says: "Ulster wants only to be left alone to complete her unity with Britain," while the Sinn Fein, speaking through Shaw Desmond, says the new plan is a red flag to the Irish bull already seeing red. The Nationalist is, for the moment, mute.

Yet those who claim to know Ireland best say that all this is only what was inevitable. Lloyd George's tactics will justify themselves. Ulster evidently is much gratified by the justification which she finds for her preparations for the rebellion in 1914 and Lloyd George's reasoned proof that Protestant Ulster cannot be coerced, even by Sinn Fein but must be treated as a separate unit. This never before has been recognized in the British parliament.

If they unite they must do it of their own accord as did Upper and Lower Canada. Even Lynn admits this is a step forward.
Garvin's comment in the Observer, "When Ulster is absolutely guaranteed once for all against Sinn Fein domination and the separatist spirit then only economic and moral forces will compel the two Irish populations to work together."

Sinn Fein Obstinate
But what of the Sinn Fein, which seems to represent ninety-five per cent. of Roman Catholic Ireland? Sinn Fein leaders, including the minister of the Irish republic, whose latest opinions Shaw Desmond summarized, still scoff at Lloyd George's ideas. "Yesterday, perhaps, Ireland would have considered a separate Ulster as a temporary expedient, but today one Ireland, sole and indivisible, is the only national conception of Ireland, saving Northeast Ulster. What the Sinn Fein says is that his own Irish-made laws shall be administered absolutely fairly and leave us to manage Ulster," and then, as if confirming Ulster's worst fears, added: "We object to any contribution whatever to the cost of running the empire. The Sinn Fein wants to get outside the empire."

That, however, may be very far from the Sinn Fein's last word. Not a few competent Irish authorities assert that a good half of the nominal Sinn Feiners now are vigorously denouncing among themselves the attack on the Viceroy. Even more than half are reflecting upon the large limits to national life which Lloyd George's plan would set up. In a similar sense an authoritative writer in the Sunday Times says: "A leading Irishman now here thinks the Sinn Fein movement is in brittle condition. It is no secret that the extremist section has come under control of Bolshevik emissaries from the Clyde who are out for Soviet rule in Ireland. This new development is making the Catholic hierarchy furiously to think. So far Sinn Fein has had the active support of a great majority of the country priests and the undisguised sympathy of the hierarchy but with a Sinn Fein of a Bolshevik objective, how could the church stand firm? In such a case it might well fall back upon Lloyd George's scheme, partition and all. And in all, Ireland's last word is always the church."
