SUCCESSFUL AGRICULTURAL MEETING

Agricultural Society No. 132 held a successful meeting on Saturday afternoon in Burt's hall. A good number had gathered at the hall when the chairman arrived to open the session.

This was one of the most interesting and largely attended sessions in the history of the society.

During the week an appeal had been sent broadcast among the farmers throughout the districts surrounding Hartland making a strong plea for support in order to keep this organization going as it should.

As a result of considerable agitation along propagation lines and a little plain talk at the meeting a new and more encouraging spirit seemed to prevail and before the meeting adjourned some thirty or forty paid up members were enrolled.

A strenuous canvas is being made to enlist one hundred or more into the society, and failing this a number have pledged themselves to stand a heavier assessment in order to meet the conditions laid down by the government.

This was the annual meeting and after all business had been looked after the retiring officers made their reports. The finances of the society were fully gone into and all transactions covering the whole history of the society were shown up and fully explained.

Notice was given that at the next regular meeting action would be taken as to the selection of the two particular breeds of cattle to be adopted by this society, as required by the live stock law in order to benefit by the bonus granted by the local government.

Between this date and the third Wednesday in this month, when the society meets again, upwards of 70 new names are required. How close to the mark can we come?

A paid up membership is not our aim alone that sort of thing is simply no good, but it's a farmer, with an interest in the thing, one with a sense of the advantages to be worked out of this sort of institution and big with a determination to take hold in an endeavor to help himself and the other man as well.

It is men with needs, and determination to have those needs looked after, that make such a society as this a success, and no one else can do it.

A tidy bank account is now available for the use of the society and it only lacks the proper interest to set the machinery going but this can never be done as long as the farmer element hangs back and leaves everything to the manipulation of a bunch made up from the medical profession, machinery agencies, merchants and druggists.

Don't wait to be canvassed come into the meeting and take hold with a determination to stand by this thing from now on.
