VANCOUVER EXHIBITION OPENED YESTERDAY
Vancouver, Sept. 3.—The Vancouver Exhibition was formally opened this evening by an electric spark sent from Ottawa by the pressure of the hand of His Royal Highness The Duke of Connaught. The lights which had been dimmed pending the contact immediately sprang into bright illumination and a series of aerial bombs were fired, casting a glow over the city. About 8,000 people were on the grounds, nearly half of the number being in the horse show where the opening ceremonies took place.

DEATH OF A. J. GALLETTY
Victoria, Sept. 3.—The death occurred this afternoon of Mr. A. J. C. Galletty, for many years manager of the Bank of Montreal here. Mr. Galletty, who retired about two years ago was chatting to friends on the life range when he suddenly collapsed.

NATIVES OF SOUTH AFRICA LOYAL

London, Sept. 3.—The correspondent of Reuters Telegram Company at Capetown, South Africa, sends the following:

"The magistrate in the Transvaal territories (division on the east coast of Cape Colony) the population of which is one million, have been travelling among the natives upon instructions from the government explaining the war situation. "Tens of thousands have been addressed and the natives everywhere enthusiastically have offered their services to the government. This is typical of the striking unanimity prevailing among every degree of civilization throughout South Africa."

REMOVING THE WOUNDED
London, Sept. 3.—A despatch to the Chronicle from Paris states that orders have been issued for the removal of all wounded from Paris to Rennes and Nantes.
