Gordon of Falls Church, Virginia, and  
Sergeant Richard of Shenandoah. The  
officers of the Union forces, now residents  
of Chicago, have been selected. Fifteen  
thousand dollars will be subscribed in  
Chicago for the contingent and like sums  
from New York, Philadelphia and  
Boston contingents. It is also stated  
that a high command in the new Irish  
brigade has been offered to a distinguished  
soldier, and rumor has it that he has  
accepted. This officer is said to be Gen.  
Fitzhugh Lee. The organization seems  
well planned and well equipped in all its  
parts. The various cities contributing  
quotas are reported as enthusiastic  
to the last degree. The brigade com-  
posed of 1,000 men and 100 horses, and  
equipped with Remington rifles, while the  
cavalry will carry sabres and Spencer rifles.  
These men will report in New York in  
two and three days from thence and will  
be sent to France, by some believed to  
be Marseilles.
