Stevenson alongside the wharf, dismantle and put her in charge of Collector Gore, to be delivered to the owners on payment of the fine imposed, \$400. The B. R. Stevenson is a fishing schooner and was seized in St. Andrews harbor Tuesday last week, by Captain McLean, for violation of the fishery law, part of the crew and outfit being American.—Sun.

Why Inspector Gilman Smiles.—The Eastport Sentinel says: "Another annual sale of partridge by Uncle Sam will soon take place here. On the steamer State of Maine, there are just shipped from St. John a week ago last Monday, two cases for Boston, marked and invoiced as fresh bass. Officer Doughty, of the Dominion Customs service, who was on the lookout for just such games as these, examined the packages at St. John, but didn't look deep enough and only saw a few frozen fish on top, but when the cases arrived on this side they were found to contain 450 partridges as well as a few frozen bass. This is why Inspector Gilman smiles when he meets Inspector Doughty."

The death is announced, in his eighty-sixth year, of Horatio Ross, the greatest shot in the United Kingdom, both at target and deer, famous as a sportsman, rider, and himself half a century ago, when duelling was in vogue, one of the best pistol shots in Europe. Mr. Ross lived in Wyke Lodge, Wyke, a mountain in the Highlands of Scotland. The walls of his home were with trophies of the chase in the shape of deer heads, &c. The sideboard in the dining room groans under the weight of the numerous prizes won by his rifle at the target butts. Among these are the Wimbledon Cup, only completed for the winners; the Association Cup and the Duke of Cambridge's Cup. In 1867 at Cambridge, after two long and arduous days, he shot 1000 and 1100 yards, fifteen shots at each range each day, he—then in his sixty-sixth year—vanquished some thirty of the best rifle shots of the Kingdom and added thereby the Cambridge Cup to his collection. His sons, Hercules, Colin and Edward are famous shots, and his wife, too, had a great reputation in this way.

Dr. Selwyn, director of the geological survey of Canada, who has just returned from England, where he has been a Canadian Commissioner to the Colonial Exhibition, considers it to have been of immense benefit to all the Colonies, but to Canada especially, as it has placed before the English public samples of nearly all the Canadian manufactures and products, and has shown them that it would be advantageous to themselves to import many products of Canadian manufacture, such as furniture, organs, carriage wood and other wooden manufactures, which on account of the abundance of the splendid wood in Canada can be manufactured and exported to England much cheaper than they can be manufactured in that country. The exhibition has had the effect also of making the English people better acquainted with this country, and dispelling many erroneous impressions. Up to the time it was opened he says, many people in England had never heard of Canada except as an arctic wilderness, covered nearly all the year round with ice and snow, but when the array of Canadian exhibits were exposed to their astonished gaze all England rang with the praises of Canada.

DEATH AS A DETECTIVE.

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 21.—A singular case of speedy exposure overtaking a man in the midst of a secret career was brought to light to-day. Some two years ago, a German, giving his name as John Forstner, applied to Samuel Simpson for employment in the watch department of his jewelry store, No. 216 South Street. Beyond saying that he was last from Cleveland, O., he told little about his past life, where he was first employed, and did not grow more communicative as time progressed. To-day, while going to dinner, Forstner dropped dead from heart disease. Word was immediately sent to Mr. Simpson, and as the dead man had no relatives in this country, the jeweller gave instructions to have every attention paid the remains. The dead man had few personal effects, but when an ordinary travelling-bag was lifted from the floor Mr. Simpson was surprised at its weight and opened it to ascertain the cause. He was amazed, for before him in the bag he saw \$4,000 worth of jewelry, comprising rings of every description, gold watches, pins and diamonds, brooches, chains and charms. All this valuable property had been stolen from his own store by the man whom he had trusted and befriended in life and death. In Forstner's clothes were found jewels only recently stolen. The cost market even had not been removed and it was an easy matter for Mr. Simpson to identify his property.

IMMENSE DAMAGE ON THE COAST.

LONDON, Dec. 28.—The Daily News says: "The telegraph wires in the city last night were snapping with alarming rapidity and in Fleet street policemen carried the broken wires round lamp posts. The train on the Midland line was delayed an hour by the falling of telegraph wires across the track. A large number of telegraph and telephone wires fell over the metropolitan area. There was very severe weather. At Reading snow fell in the afternoon heavier than had been experienced in many years, whilst the wind blew a hurricane, causing considerable damage to the roofs of houses, and trees were injured by branches being torn off by the violence of the wind. From Bath to Bristol all the telegraph poles are wrecked, most of the poles being splintered like matchwood and lying in all directions. Railway 'block' lines are down, trains are considerably delayed and are signalled along the line by flags. It is probable that the wires between Bristol and London will not be repaired for two or three days. Telegraph lines in other directions have suffered equally, as can be ascertained. The damage will be greater than for several years by snow and hurricanes. Many wrecks are reported on the southern and eastern coast. The damage to life and property is great. Several railway accidents are reported."

GALL AND WORMWOOD TO THE GRITS.

During the eleven months this year forty-two railways in the United States and Canada showed increased receipts of \$10,300,000 over the corresponding period of last year. Two of the lines, the Grand Trunk and C. P. R., which show increased earnings the last 11 months of \$3,500,000 more than the same period last year. The two Canadian roads show an increase of 24 per cent. of their receipts. And yet the Grits are not happy. The railway barometer shows the country is prospering, which is something the Opposition never mention. It is gall and wormwood to them.

It is a curious circumstance that in America, Prince Charlie and in England, Thuringian Prince, both out of the same nature, should have died within a week of each other.
